A sailor suffering from a severe attack of pneumonia was the cause of the arrival of H. M. S. Calcutta in this port on Saturday morning. The sick sailor was at once taken to the P. E. I. Hospital where he is reported as doing well.

Arriving at 7.30 a.m. the vessel under the command of Vice-Admiral Sir James Ferguson, K.C.B., K.C.M.G., was officially visited at 10.45 by His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, accompanied by his aides, Col. J. P. Hooper and Lieut. Buntain and was received with a salute of fifteen guns.

The Governor's visit was later returned by Admiral Ferguson, accompanied by Capt. Ramsay and Lieut. Everett.

The officers of the ship were entertained at the Charlottetown Club on Saturday afternoon.

Yesterday quite a number of visitors inspected the ship.

While bathing off the Government Wharf at Mount Stewart yesterday afternoon between two and three o'clock Robert Myers, a young man in his early twenties, got into difficulties and was drowned, despite heroic efforts to save him by Herbert Dunn, who himself almost lost his life in attempting the rescue.

The deceased, aged between twenty and twenty five years, was a son of Mr. James Myers, Head of Hillsboro.

With two or three others, including Mr. Dunn, the victim of the accident was bathing about half-past two at the wharf, which is just below the road bridge. The narrow bridge opening causes a swift current which runs past the wharf, over which young Myers jumped, although he was not a strong swimmer. The tide was running out and carried him far beyond his depth. Unable to make shore he made signals for help, which Dunn answered but with little result; the current being almost more than the latter could breast, and it being only with difficulty that he again reached shore completely exhausted.

The body was recovered at 6 o'clock by Mr. Alban McKenzie of Mount Stewart.

The city, he said, was grateful to the Charlottetown Brigade for inviting the visitors and the local department was grateful to the visitors for accepting the invitation.

His Worship then expanded the visiting firemen the freedom of the city, and on the conclusion of his remarks was the recipient of three luscious cheers from his audience, which were repeated for Chief Ranahan and the Charlottetown Fire Department.

The meeting terminated with the drawing of positions for the Tournament today by the different departments. Yesterday afternoon the visitors were taken to Beach Grove Inn in motorbats, where luncheon was served, and a group photograph taken by Crawwell.

The weather was ideal for the first day's racing of Old Home Week and the races drew an attendance of about 2500 people. The racing was splendid in every way, every class was split up and the many surprises made it very exciting for the spectators who pronounced it about the snappiest racing they had seen for years. McNutt, the Senior Officer in charge of the 82nd Regiment, after he had read the following petition: To Trustees, St. James Presbyterian Church, Charlottetown, P. E. I.

The Department of National Defence of Ottawa under date of July 6th 1925 has given the Prince Edward Island Regiment authority to take over the Regimental Colours of this unit, (formerly 82nd Regt.) for the purpose of having Battle Honours emblazoned thereon. As you have been good enough to care for these Colours while the Honours were being earned and still have them in your possession, I would respectfully request that you turn them over to this unit. Proper arrangements are being made that this may be carried out with all due military ceremony.

The above on the understanding that the present Roman figures and inscription be not changed, and that after the colours are returned to St. James Presbyterian Church for safe keeping until later required for military purposes.

Major McNutt then addressed the officers and men of the new regiment in which he gave them a brief history of the colours which had been presented and dedicated on July 4, 1908, stating that he felt sure they would be honored by them with the same reverence as was accorded to them by the parent regiment.

Col. McLeod gave a brief address thanking Major McNutt on behalf of the Prince Edward Island Regiment. The King's Colour was at once returned to the Church and the Regimental Colour was carried by the Guard during the unveiling of the Soldiers Monument. It will later be emblazoned with the Battle Honours after which it will be returned to St. James Church.

The death occurred in this city suddenly at 9 o'clock last night of Mr. Pictou Simon Brown, well known hotel man and race horse owner, in the seventy second year of his life.

The late Mr. Brown was born at Oxbridge, Ontario, on the 19th day of April, 1873, and moved to Charlottetown in 1877. In 1878 he married Miss Margaret Thorne of this city, who survives him. About 1890 Mr. Brown purchased the Revere Hotel, of which he was still proprietor at the time of his death. Always actively engaged in civic and provincial politics, the deceased was for a long term of years a member of the City Council, and in 1916 was elected to the honored and dignified position of Chief Magistrate of the City.

All his life the late Mr. Brown has been a highly respected and valued citizen, and has always interested himself in welfare and the betterment of the community. During the time he has been a resident of this town his genial disposition has made him many friends and created for him a popularity given to but few.

Right up to the day of his death he was about as usual, and was seen in the racing sulky as late as Wednesday, when he raced at the Exhibition track. His death therefore will come as a great shock to the people of the city and province. There are left to mourn besides a sorrowing widow the following three children, Mrs. George McCormack, Pictou, C. and Byron, all living in this city.

The funeral will take place on Saturday morning.
