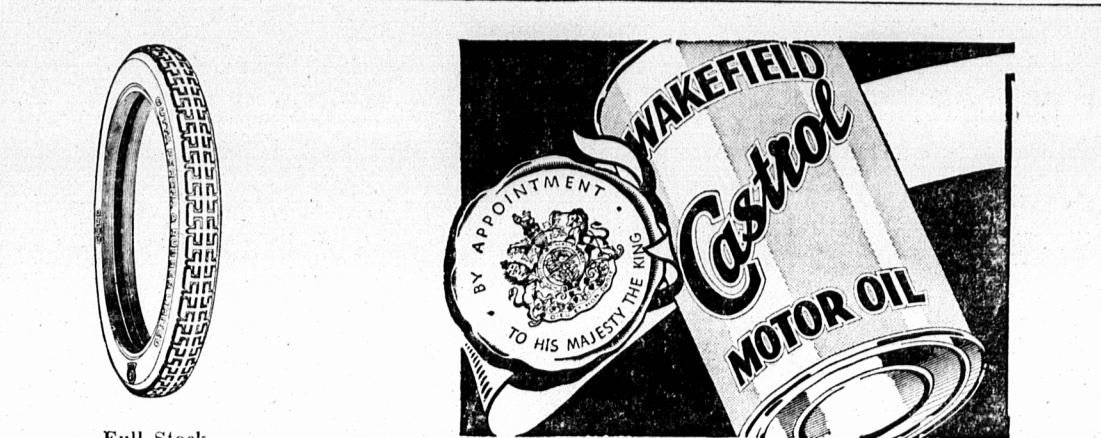

GRAIN

WINNIPEG, Aug. 14 (CP)—Trading in wheat futures on the Winnipeg grain exchange was at a virtual standstill today with October and December futures closing at the minimum fixed levels of 73 5-8 and 74 5-8 cents a bushel respectively. Reports from New York that 1,000,000 bushels of Canadian wheat had been worked for export from the eastern seaboard late yesterday could not be confirmed here. Buenos Aires was unchanged to 3-8 lower at noon. Mills were credited with picking up small quantities of nos. 2 & 3 northern on the cash wheat market. CHICAGO, Aug. 14 (AP)—Wheat prices dipped about 1-2 cent a bushel today and then steadied, holding at a level only fractionally above the seasonal lows established yesterday. Wheat closed 1-4-3-4 lower than yesterday, Sept 72 3-4-7-8, Dec 74 7-4 1-8; corn 1-4-1-2 lower, Sept 69 1-2-5-8, Dec 55 3-4; oats unchanged to 3-8 lower.

P., which, according to police, discharged after Skuce was struck in the neck by an ejected shell from the automatic which Turnbull was firing. The bullet struck McLachlan's ribs then glanced into Turnbull's body. The three men were standing side by side facing the target when the accident occurred.
