Maple Leafs Leave For Training Camp Minus Nine Of Last Year's Players

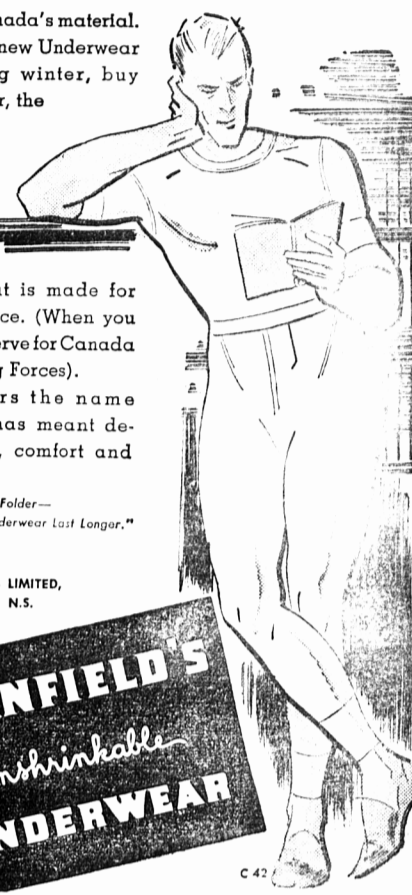

TORONTO, Oct. 13 (CP)—Minus nine players who helped the club win the Stanley Cup last season, Toronto Maple Leafs held their annual pre-season luncheon here today, then left for their St. Catharines, Ont., training camp. The hockey champions were accompanied by their training quartet by coach Sam Cook and seven members of the Providence Reds of the American Hockey League with which club the Leafs have a working agreement. A number of amateur players who hope to make the professional grade also went along. At the luncheon attended by civic and club officials, players and former players, general manager Frank Selke of the Maple Leaf Gardens told the players that since the highest federal authorities considered that hockey was essential for national morale, the players should take their jobs seriously. Picks Hughson Jacobs Of Opinion That Louis Will Go Back To Ring Warfare Again

NEW YORK, Oct. 13 (AP)—Our old friend Robert J. Brennan is back to tell us who were the best pitchers in the major leagues in the 1942 season, and just to avoid unnecessary suspense we'll blurt out that his choices are Tex Hughson of Boston Red Sox in the American League and Mort Cooper of St. Louis Cardinals in the National League. Brennan as a hobby painstakingly keeps a day-by-day record of mound performances throughout the season, and arrives at his conclusions through a revised Stanley-Dean system, whatever that is. Anyway, pitchers are rated on the following basis: For instance, a pitcher defeating a team that is in first place on that particular day receives 14 points and so on down until he gets only seven points for beating a last-place club. Brennan's figures show Hughson with a record of 22 victories and seven defeats, topping the junior circuit with 189.22 points, and Cooper's identical win-and-loss record bringing him 163.11 points. Other leaders in the American League in order were: Ernie Bonham, Yankees 144.69; Spud Chandler, Yankees 96.03; Hank Borowy, Yankees 87.91; Ted Lyons, White Sox 71.08; Jim Bagby, Cleveland 66.91; Mace Brown, Red Sox 56.12; and Virgil Trucks, Detroit 55.00. In the National League were: Johnny Beasley, Cards 151.11; Whit Wyatt, Dodgers 131.15; Larry French, Dodgers 115.14; Curt Davis, Dodgers 96.38; Bill Lohrman, Giants 81.16; Cliff Melton, Giants 71.31; Howard Krist, Cards 68.53; Max Lanier, Cards 67.46; and Johnny Vander Meer 61.88.

NORTH SYDNEY, N.S., Oct. 12 (CP)—Creston horsemen today staged a benefit race program for Ollie Rudderham, veteran trainer and driver who has been in hospital for three weeks. Is Acquitted Of Manslaughter

MONTREAL, Oct. 13 (CP)—Englebert Savard, 29, of Montreal was acquitted by jury today of a charge of manslaughter arising out of the death Aug. 3 of Anita Laplante, 22. The jury rendered the verdict without leaving the court room after Crown Prosecutor Gerald Fauriol, K.C., told Mr. Justice Wilfrid Lauzon that there was insufficient evidence to establish any element of crime in the case. One witness testified during the trial that Miss Laplante was seen getting into a motor car with Savard the night of Aug. 7. Another said that the doors of a car rented to Savard were open under pressure from a strong wind which blew outside or from light pressure on the inside unless they were firmly closed. Evidence showed that the girl died of a cerebral hemorrhage and skull fracture suffered apparently in a fall to the pavement.

Gas, Tire Rules For Motorists In 31 U.S. States

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13 (AP)—The United States office of price administration formally announced today that motorists would be limited to five tires per car beginning next month, and at the same time disclosed that registration for gasoline ration books would start Nov. 9 in the 31 states where gasoline now is rationed. Every car owner in these states will be entitled, as in the rationed past, to at least enough gas to drive 2,880 miles a year—slightly less than four gallons a week. Supplemental rations will be provided for necessary purposes upon application to local boards. It had previously been disclosed that actual rationing in the 31 states would become effective Nov. 22. Nationwide gasoline rationing was recommended by the Baruch rubber committee to save the rubber on existing tires. Henderson said issuance of ration books would be contingent on these two provisions: 1. The car owner must swear he has no more than five tires. 2. He must agree to periodic inspection of his tires.

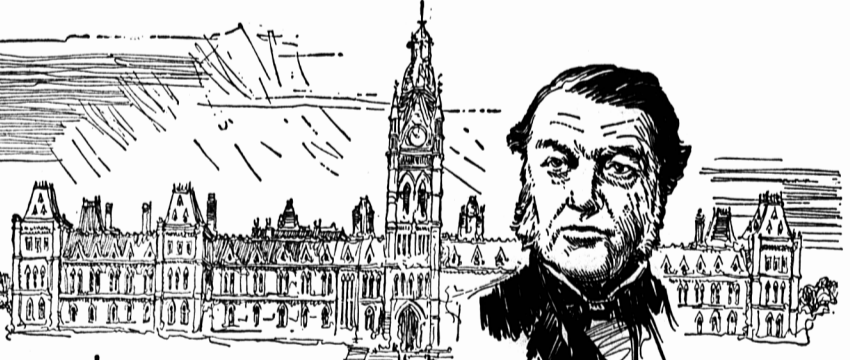

HORSE-SHOE DOUBLES

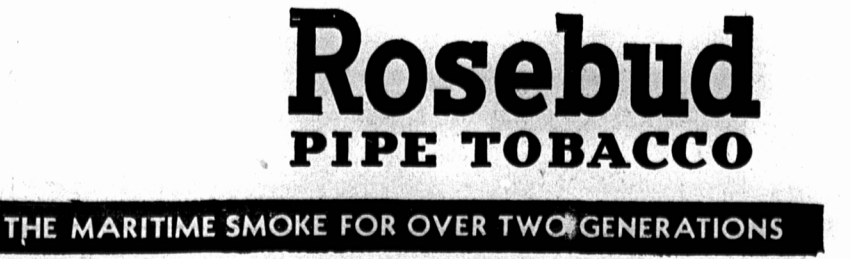
