THE CITY'S CREDIT.--According to Councillor D. J. Riley, the chairman of the Finance Committee of the City Council, there is something out of the ordinary about the civic expenditure during the past year. It is that the Council were able to place to the credit of the sum of \$2,000 being \$2,000 in excess of the amount usually put aside for that purpose. Mr. Riley says it is a matter that must be very gratifying to the citizens of Charlottetown to know that that important sinking fund is being kept up. It is important that a point as possible, because it insures the credit of the city. As to that, the credit of Charlottetown, he thinks, is higher now than that of any city of its size in Canada. The definition also true in the relation of its assets to liabilities. The Market House Sinking Fund has now been brought to the point required by law, while the other sinking funds have also been unusually increased, and after having done this, there is a surplus on the year's working of \$128 over liabilities. This showed, he said the careful manner in which the money of the citizens of Charlottetown had been handled. To Mr. Riley's way of thinking, these splendid results are due more to the efforts of the City Clerk and his assistants than to anybody else. But of course they always had the ready and able co-operation of the Council, without which little could otherwise have been accomplished. Councillor Riley pays a high tribute to the zeal with which his fellow-Councillors discharged their duties during the past two years.

CONCERT LAST NIGHT.--In the hall of the Prince of Wales College last night, a large audience assembled and were treated to a very enjoyable concert programme which was arranged under the auspices of the Mayor and City Council of Charlottetown for the entertainment of the students attending the Short Course in Agriculture now being held in Charlottetown. The programme was arranged by Mr. J. A. B. Mayer, Chairman of the Entertainment Committee of the Board of Trade to whom much credit is due. Mr. R. H. Jenkins, retiring President of the Board, presided. The programme was varied and was delightfully sustained by a number of Charlottetown's best known amateur artists. Recreos were frequent and were well deserved. The various contributions were: Vocal solos by Miss Hughes from Harry Lauder by Mr. A. E. A. B. who appeared in costume; a reading by Mr. H. L. Bethune; a musical comedy skit by Mr. J. A. Trainor; while Miss Mary Bartlett, Miss K. Stanley and Professor Watkins presided at the piano. ### IN MEMORIAM

MRS. JAMES G. JUDDSON.

On the 10th of December last, there passed to the great beyond, one of the oldest and most respected of the inhabitants of Charlottetown, in the person of Mrs. James G. Juddson. Upwards of five years ago, Mrs. Juddson was stricken with eczema, from the effects of which she never fully recovered. From then until her death she had the constant attendance of Dr. G. P. Dewar, who did all that medical skill could do to alleviate her sufferings and prolong her days. The doctor's efforts for her comfort were ably seconded by her devoted and affectionate daughter, Mary, who tenderly nursed her, by night and by day, throughout her prolonged illness. Although ailing so long, she seemed, until a few hours before her death, to be in no immediate danger. Then a sudden change was noticed, and her children within reach, were summoned to her bedside, and the doctor called. In response to the summons, her son James Henry and his wife arrived previous to her death, the doctor, and other members of the family shortly after.

Mrs. Juddson, whose maiden name was Jane Jones, was born at Pownal eighty-two years ago. The Jones family was a highly respected and gifted one, not the least gifted of whom was the late Mrs. Juddson. Two brothers, George and John, and two sisters, Hannah (Mrs. Jenkins), and Mary (Mrs. McPhail), predeceased her. The surviving members of the family are William, David and James at Pownal; Dr. Robert, for many years a professor at Acadia University, Wolfville, N. S., where he still resides, and Abbie (Mrs. H. Burke), residing in the United States. Two children predeceased her, viz: John D. and Hannah M. (Mrs. H. A. Robertson). The surviving children are: William H. and James H., of Alexandria, George R., of Oregon, U.S.A., Mary, at home; Abbie E. (Mrs. W. Drake), of Charlottetown; and Ada J. (Mrs. MacMillan), of Alexandria. The grand-children are nineteen in number and there are ten great-grand-children, of a kindly and cheerful disposition. She always had the glad word of welcome for all who came to visit her. She always manifested an interest in everything that tended to the moral and spiritual uplift of the community. She was a kind and sympathetic neighbor and friend always ready to extend a helping hand to the troubled and distressed.

During a revival in the Pownal Methodist Church 63 years ago, conducted by the pastor, Rev. Herbert Starr, she with many others, espoused herself to the service of the Lord, in which service she continued faithful and zealous during the remainder of her life. Forty-three years ago, she united with the Baptist Church at Alexandria, during the ministry of the Rev. Mr. Archibald. In all church work she was ever active. She was one of the original members of the Women's Missionary Aid Society, in connection with the Alexandria Church, of which Society she was a member until her death. The meetings of the Society were frequently held in her home, as were occasionally the Church Prayer meetings. She was always noted for her piety and her devotion to the exercises in connection with

## THE CAR FERRY PREPARATIONS

SHEDIAC, N. B., Jan. 15.--The contractors for the terminals at Carleton Head, P. E. I., have arrived at Shediac with their plant and will procure all the stone required for this immense contract from the Smith quarry at that place. Messrs. Roger Miller & Sons, of Toronto, who have the contract, are one of the largest contracting firms in the Dominion of Canada in this work. The plant already on the ground consists of engines, both stationary and locomotive; cars, for conveying the stones from the quarry to the wharf at Point du Chene; quarrying machinery, hoisting gear, etc., in fact, a first class plant for the work in view. Several buildings have already been built at the quarry and every available house that could be secured in the town or vicinity has been rented for the use of the employees. In fact, the absence of houses is a serious drawback to the proper accommodation of such an addition to the Shediac population, but it is hoped by spring to remedy this want by building a number of houses on the Callagher property, about forty lots being sold already. At the quarry there is also under construction a Marconi tower, which will keep the firm in constant communication with the work at Carleton Head, where a similar tower is being constructed, and also with their large towboats between the two points; the boats being equipped with wireless apparatus. Large sidings are being built to facilitate the loading of large scows from the cars. Three tug boats and a large number of scows will comprise the fleet and it is expected that the work will take upwards of three years to complete. At the present time it is estimated that the firm will use about 300,000 yards of stone, which figures may be increased, as the stone for making the concrete work will be crushed at the quarry, and some changes may be made in the concrete work, which will increase the quantity.
