**History of Presby. W. M. S. On Island**

Following is the annual report of the Historical Secretary, Mrs. W. A. Stewart, for 1931-32 of the W. M. S. Presbyterian for Presbyterian Church of Prince Edward Island, as given at the Annual Meeting in Charlottetown on Tuesday.

In September last your Secretary visited Alberton and took a picture of the old house of the martyred Gordons. The tablets that were placed in Alberton Church in their memory are in the hands of the United Church now. In 1857 George Nicol Gordon went as a missionary to Eromanga filled four years with labors of love and there received the martyr's crown. His brother James S. Gordon offered to fill the vacant place. He too met the martyr's death. Of them the poet wrote:

Sad Eromanga, blood stained shore; Again bedewed with martyr's gore— With sorrowing hearts we breathe thy name, And mourn thy darkness sin and shame

Eromanga chained and fettered, Sheltered by the leafy palm Did their dying graves not thrill you

Breaking on the noonday calm Avenue, by scattering o'er that land A faithful missionary band Baptized for the dead, to prove How Christians overcome by love.

I am indebted to Mrs. P. McIntyre, St. James Church for three valuable books. One book of Psalms and Paraphrases dated 1718. A book Subordinate Standards and Authoritative Documents of the free Church of Scotland published by authority of the General Assembly. Memoir of the life of Rev. Thomas Haly Burton, Professor of Divinity in the University of St. Andrews, Scotland.

I have been informed that the first Presbyterian to die on the Island was a Simpson and he is buried in the old cemetery on the Malpeque Road. Until the time of his death there was not any Presbyterian Ministers, and the people received mail only once a month. When word came that a minister was coming to preach to them he said "The time of the singing of birds is come and the voice of the turtle is heard in our land;" (Solomon 2, 12) and he died.

The first Presbyterian Church was built at Covehead, the second in Belfast and the third in Princetown or Malpeque.

The first Women's Missionary Society was formed on Dr. Geddie's congregation in 1837 and the first contribution to missions was sent to the London Missionary Society in the year 1840 and amounted to \$17, 11c about \$85.00 in our money. It seemed a very small sum but the people at that time had very little money. They exchanged their grain for goods, and the minister's salary was paid mostly in produce.

Thy saints take pleasure in her stores

Her very dust to them is dear, All heathen lands and kingly thrones

On earth thy glorious name shall fear.

In an old cemetery, very small and overgrown with trees and long grass at St. Peter's Harbour is the grave of the Rev. Peter Gordon the first minister to be settled on the Island in 1806. His pastoral charge was Covehead, Bay Fortune and St. Peter's. I visited this place recently and took a photograph of his stone. On the stone is the following inscription

**Indians To Give Hiawatha Play**

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., June 30.—(By The Canadian Press)—

"Forth upon the Gitche Gumme, On the Shining Big-Sea-Water, With his fishing line of cedar, Of the bark of twisted cedar, Forth to catch the sturgeon Nahma, Mishe-Nahma, King of Fishes, In his birch canoe exulting, All alone went Hiawatha."

Using Longfellow's immortal Hiawatha as their theme, Ojibway Indians of this district will present their 32nd Hiawatha play during Wolf Week, July 25-30, this year.

Sault Ste. Marie is the centre of the Hiawatha country, and every corner of the region is identified with some legend of the Indian Prometheus. It was on the site of the present city of Sault Ste. Marie there stood the ancient village of Pawiting, which tradition says was the home of Hiawatha.

The meaning of Pawiting is "rapids here," and it was "into the swift Pawiting" that Kwastind threw the huge stone.

"Gitche Gumme" was the Indian word for Lake Superior, while Mishe Nahma, "big sturgeon" is still the king of fishes in Lake Superior.

The play starts with the gathering of the tribes at the call of Gitche Manitou, and traces the life of Hiawatha from babyhood until his departure toward the setting sun, standing erect with his paddle outstretched in a canoe which is propelled by some mysterious unseen power. It shows him learning to shoot his bow and arrow, and his romantic wooing of Minnehaha. The performance is given at the river side, and the whole scene has the appearance of being lifted bodily from the days when Brule first came upon the ancestors of the performers.

was the sacred shrine of the Ojibways, earliest known inhabitants of the region and at that time probably the most populous Indian nation north of Mexico. The Ojibways roamed as lords over a territory 1,000 miles wide, extending from north and east of Lake Huron to the Turtle Mountains in Manitoba.

Ojibways who made the trip to the rapids at Pawiting made a holy pilgrimage, much as the Mohammedan who visited Mecca. The rapids—now the St. Mary's rapids—were the most sacred spot known to the Ojibways, for there, according to their traditions, their ancestors were created and their people blessed by the Manitou. From there too their nation dispersed around Lake Superior.

**Should Protect Historic Documents**

NEWMARKET, Ont., June 30.—(By The Canadian Press)—Deploring the fact that so much valuable historic information had been regarded as worthless and destroyed by Perkins Bull, K. C. speaking before some 150 members of the York Pioneers' Society at the annual pilgrimage here urged that the Provincial Government be petitioned to erect a fireproof room in some public building in every county, where records of historic value could be stored.

The speaker advocated that every York Pioneer be obliged as a condition of membership to the society to compile a record of his family's life in old Ontario. Such records would in future prove the greatest value to historians. The present generation was the last that will be able to gather them, he said. The speaker requested the society to exercise its influence to preserve the small country churches which were closing their doors to give way to more pretentious buildings.
