MONTREAL, Jan 23—Fresh eggs dropped one to two cents a dozen on the Montreal produce and dairy market today.

Carrots or less of fresh graded eggs continued last week's decline. Extras were down one to two cents at 22 to 24 cents while firsts and pullets lost a cent a dozen. Receipts totaled 1,900 cases.

Butter eased a quarter of a cent to 20 1/2 to 21 cents a pound for carlots or less of no 1 grass make. Receipts were 400 boxes.

Potatoes were down five cents. New Brunswick green mountains per 80 pound bag selling at 80 cents. Prince Edward Island green mountains per 80 pound bag at 80 cents and Prince Edward Island green mountains per 90 pound bag at 85 cents.

A better tone was experienced by cheese prices, current receipts of Ontario white gaining a quarter of a cent at 9 cents, current Ontario colored was unchanged at 10 cents as was early Ontario make at 10 1/2 to 11 1/2 cents. Receipts were only 18 boxes.

LIVESTOCK

MONTREAL, Jan 23—Cattle receipts were 1101 today. Last week's increase in prices brought a heavier run of cattle and buyers were trying for lower prices. The few early sales were made at \$3.00 to \$3.40 for medium plain to low medium light steers and at \$2.00 to \$2.75 for butcher cows, with the odd good cows picked out at \$3.00. Cows and calves sold for 75 cents to \$1.25 and one load of butcher cattle, averaging medium good to good in quality sold for \$1.90. Calf receipts were 50. The quality of the calves offered was better than last week. Trading was active at steady prices. The few grass calves offered were about a quarter higher at \$2.00 to \$2.50. The bulk of the calves sold were sold between \$1.50 and \$2.00. Fair to medium calves were weighed at \$5.75, with medium good kinds at \$6.00 and odd small sales at \$6.25. A couple of good calves were sold up to \$7.00.

Supreme Court
