Great Reception Given Bennett

Spoke To Capacity Audience In Regina—Scores Unemployment Situation In Canada.

REGINA, Sask., June 10—Another capacity audience faced Hon. R. B. Bennett in his second campaign speech here tonight. The Armouries where the Conservatives chieftain spoke was crowded both on the main

floor and in the upper balconies. A feature of the audience was the attendance of unemployed men estimated at 1,500 in number.

In opening his remarks, Mr. Bennett said it seemed only a few short weeks ago when he spoke here in January last. He wished, the Conservative leader said to congratulate the people of Regina in their large attendance. No idle curiosity brings you here on such a warm summer's night he declared, but a deep rooted interest in the National affairs of our country. Mr. Bennett went on to speak of the sense of responsibility which seized him in the position he now occupied. Canada was blessed with great natural resources he proceeded, but yet we find something which saddened his heart today. I met men wearing the white buttons and all they ask is the chance to work. Think what it is to have a wife and children and all you men ask is a chance for employment. He went on, I never in all my life saw such unemployment in this Canada of ours as in this year of 1930.

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5 PARTIES BATTLE IN ELECTIONS

149 Nominated For Alberta Fight—Four Acclamations Are Accorded Prov. Govt. Party.

EDMONTON, Alta., June 10—Representing five parties and an independent group, 149 provincial election candidates were nominated today in Alberta's 53 ridings. June 19 is election day.

But four acclamations were given, each going to a member of the Government party. Premier J. E. Brownlee was acclaimed in the Ponoka riding; Hon. O. L. McPherson, Minister of Public Works, received acclamation in Little Bow, and M. McKeenan and Hugh Allen, both members of the Government ranks in the last Legislature, were returned in Lac Ste. Anne and Grand Prairie ridings, respectively.

The Government (U. F. A.) party is represented in each of the rural ridings.

Party representation in the field is: U. F. A., 47; Liberal, 36; Conservative, 19; Labor, 11; Communist, 3; Independent, 23.

Nine prospective candidates dropped out of the lists and an equal number entered at the last minute. The surprise of the day was when S. T. Bigelow, Edmonton barrister, announced himself as Conservative candidate in Glengarry riding.

FOREST FIRES ARE AGAIN THREATENING

Thunder Bay District Again In Danger—Fire In Some Sections Spreading Into The Heavy Timber.

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., June 10.—Forest fires in the Thunder Bay district are again assuming major proportions. Warm days and moderate breezes are building up the various bodies of flame that were not completely extinguished by the rains of a week ago, which relieved the situation when the whole district seemed to be threatened. The forestry service is unable to withdraw men from places where the fires have partially subdued to put them where the danger is again threatening. The vicinity of Mack, about eighty miles from here on the Canadian National line northwest to Sioux Lookout, appears to be the centre of the most serious fire at present. The service has 75 men there, but the fire is said to be spreading into the heavy timber. The situation is described as discouraging. In Helen township, where big losses were suffered last week by the Abitibi Company, the situation is again very bad. This is north of Hurkett, where homesteaders lost heavily. In the Union Lake section a bad fire is burning at a distance of 14 miles from the reservoir dam. More planes are being procured from the Western Canada Airways for use in carrying men and equipment.

Students Killed At Level Crossing

OAKVILLE, June 10—Two Oakville High School students are dead and one other is in the Hamilton General Hospital in serious condition as the result of being struck by a C. P. R. flier on the sixth line level crossing here shortly before 9 a. m. today as they drove to the Oakville High School in a light sedan car to write their midsummer departmental examinations. The dead are Margaret McKay, 17 year old daughter of W. C. McKay, Middle Road, clever student and champion school athlete, and Eva Booth, 18, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Booth, Middle Road, Oakville, also a clever student and an athlete. Hazel Booth, 20, and George Booth, 18, sister and brother of the dead girl are critically injured, both suffering skull fractures.

THE PRINCE OF WALES ON THE AIR TODAY

His Royal Highness Will Speak At The Launching of Liner Empress of Britain—Will Be Heard Throughout Canada.

LONDON, June 10—History will be made tomorrow when the Prince of Wales follows the example set by his father, King George V, last January, and makes a speech, which will be heard from coast to coast in Canada. His Royal Highness' remarks at the launching of the new Canadian Pacific steamship liner Empress of Britain, at Clydebank, Glasgow, will be transmitted to Canada by the Marconi beam system and will be broadcast from CFCF, Montreal, CHNS, Halifax, CFBO, St. John, CHRC, Quebec, CKGW, Toronto, CJGC, London, Ont., CKY, Winnipeg, CJRW, Fleming, Sask., CJHS, Saskatoon-Moosejaw, CKCK, Regina, CKCA, Edmonton, CJCJ, Calgary, CKLC, Red Deer, CJGX, Yorkton, Sask., and CKWX, Vancouver. The speeches of Lord Aberconway and E. W. Beatty, K. C., president of the Canadian Pacific, will also be on the air. The programme will commence at 9:40 a. m. Eastern Daylight Saving Time. The 42,500 ton liner Empress of Britain will slide into the water at approximately 1:15 p. m. Greenwich mean time.

Following the launching of the largest ship to ply in inter-empire trade with the traditional breaking of a bottle of champagne over the bows the guests will be entertained at luncheon by the builders, John Brown and Co. The Prince's health will be proposed by Lord Aberconway, chairman of the shipbuilding firm.

The Empress of Britain will have a gross registered tonnage of 42,500 and will displace 63,775 tons. She is 760 feet long, 97½ feet wide and 60 feet deep. She will carry about 1,150 passengers and will be employed in the St. Lawrence Southampton trade.

A Pledge To Canadians From Coast To Coast

In emphatic terms Monday night, Hon. R. B. Bennett, leader of the Conservative party, a native of the Maritime Provinces, set forth the platform of his party, definitely pledging the following if returned to power in the Dominion:

- 1—We pledge ourselves to a policy of protection for Canadians in the development of our natural resources, our agricultural and industrial life, and our consumers from exploitation.
- 2—We pledge ourselves to foster and develop agriculture and the livestock and dairy industries now so sadly neglected.
- 3—We pledge ourselves to the stabilization of economic conditions, and to continuity of trade and freedom from the manipulation of home and foreign tariffs.
- 4—We pledge ourselves to the development of inter-Provincial trade, and of a Canadian fuel policy, and development of a foreign market.
- 5—We pledge ourselves to the improvement of the whole scheme of Canadian transportation northward by the completion of the Hudson Bay route, and the construction of such branches as may be necessary to render it most readily available to every part of Canada; to the Pacific slope by a Peace River outlet, and east and west by the development of the St. Lawrence Waterways, and we pledge ourselves to aid existing traffic channels and to increase port facilities on the Great Lakes, Hudson Bay and the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, and to the establishment of a national highway system.
- 6—We pledge ourselves to foster and support a plan for greater empire trade based on mutual advantage.
- 7—We pledge ourselves to a national old age pensions scheme.
- 8—We pledge ourselves to such compensation adjustment as will ensure the benefit of the above policies to every part of Canada.

Modern Divorce Denounced At Gen. Assembly

HAMILTON, Ont., June 10—Modern divorce was unanimously denounced this afternoon by the Presbyterian General Assembly. Rev. Dr. W. S. MacTavish reported for his committee on the subject, and an amendment introduced by Rev. J. W. Ralston could not find a seconder. The Assembly condemned the institution of divorce as a destroyer of civilization, and urged all Ministers to fight it. The original motion proposed an appeal to the Government for the prevention of remarriage after divorce, but as revised by the committee all mention of legal action is omitted.

Will Conduct Camp Retreat

Bishop Francis Clement Kelley, of Oklahoma, will conduct the retreat for laymen of Winnipeg and district, to be held at Camp Morton the last week-end in June.

Bishop Kelley was born and educated in Canada, being a native of Prince Edward Island, and a former student of Prince of Wales College and St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown, and of Laval university, Quebec. He was ordained in 1893 for the diocese of Detroit. A large part of his work from 1905 to 1924 was concerned with the providing of religious facilities in sparsely settled regions. His efforts were made through the Church Extension society, of which he was head, and for the establishment of which he had labored. (Manitoba Free Press.)

Memorial Blown Up

Skyscraper Dedicated

CHICAGO, June 10—The Chicago Board of Trade dedicated its new skyscraper home today with a march of industrial progress from the dingy temporary quarters on South Dearborn Street to the Limestone Tower that rises forty-four stories at the foot of LaSalle Street. President Hoover, by touching a button in Washington, opened trading in the cathedral like room where millions of bushels of wheat and corn will change hands in days to come. Simultaneously the trading room was linked with the Liverpool Market by telephone and John A. Bunnell, President, talked to Alexander Slater Jr., head of the English market, who sent felicitations. Then the telephone was connected to the trading room and the rear of the wheat pit was carried across the Atlantic.
