STEAM SERVICE TO AND FROM THE MAINLAND

It was natural and proper that the Board of Trade should take prompt and energetic action as they did on Thursday on learning that a proposal was being considered at Ottawa to make a new contract with the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Company to cover a period of ten years. The fact is that the needs of the country have entirely outgrown the existing conditions, which were never anything like fair to the Island, and a renewal of the contract which would perpetuate these conditions for ten years is a proposition which the business community, unless blind to its own interests could not possibly entertain without strong protest. Such protest has been wired to Ottawa and further representations will be made by the influential delegation to be sent to the capital by the Board.

The points open to objection in the proposal to renew the existing contract include the excessive rates for passengers and freight, the infrequency of the mail service and the absence of provisions for cold storage. The existing arrangement with regard to freight compels shippers to pay three short haul rates instead of the reasonable through rate between points on the Island and points on the Mainland. Passengers pay four cents a mile for crossing the Straits, as against a maximum rate of three cents and an average rate of two cents on the railways. These conditions ought not to be permitted to continue and they suggest the remedy recommended by the Board, that the steam service connecting the Government Railways on the Mainland and the Island respectively ought also to be owned and operated by the Government summer and winter, thus giving us the benefit of through rates and uniform service such as the other Provinces enjoy.

Under the present contract our mail connection with the outside world is very unsatisfactory. We have one mail outward by two different routes in the morning and one mail inward by two routes in the evening. The mail from the mainland always arrives in the evening after business hours, and answers cannot be dispatched by mail until the second morning following, unless by business men working day and night. To ask a community of business and shipping men to consent to a perpetuation of these conditions for ten years to come is altogether unreasonable, and we do not believe the Government will ask it when once the facts are fairly presented to them. The time has come when provision must shortly be made for mails to leave the Island and arrive inward from the Mainland respectively both morning and evening. Two mails both ways daily have become an urgent necessity, and it is also but reasonable that passengers should be able to leave the Island in the evening as well as in the morning.

And we must have cold storage accommodation on the steamers traversing the Straits. For the carriage of fresh meats between the Island and the markets of Sydney, Halifax and other points on the Mainland this is imperatively necessary. Otherwise the cold storage facilities provided on the Government Railways is of practically little use to Island shippers.

Such are a few of the points which call for the earnest consideration of the Government at the present juncture and gave irresistible force to the contention of the Board of Trade that all the interests affected shall be consulted before new and permanent arrangements are made. We cannot too strongly insist that at the termination of the existing contract the Government shall deal with the entire question of steam communication between the Island and the Mainland in a broad-minded and thorough manner. Anything short of that can only lead to trouble and to the detriment of Island business interests.
