Death came with startling suddenness to Theresa A. Kiggins, of Brookvale, Lot 30, at the home of her aunt in Boston on Thursday, October 3rd. She had been conversing with her cousin until half-past ten the previous night when she retired, apparently in her usual good health. About eleven o'clock her aunt noticed her breathing heavily and at once summoned a doctor who pronounced the case one of acute pneumonia with no hope of recovery. At two o'clock Thursday morning, she lapsed into unconsciousness from which she never rallied, death coming at five o'clock that evening. The remains were brought to her home at Brookvale on Saturday night from whence the funeral took place at nine o'clock Monday morning to St. Joseph's church, Kelly's Cross, where Rev. Wilson, of Cardigan; Cora, residing in Cardigan; and Gertrude, attending Prince of Wales College.

## ABSOLUTELY NOTHING IN IT, SAYS G. M. BOSWORTH.

MONTREAL, Oct. 8.—G. M. Bosworth, vice-president of the C. P. R. in charge of steamships, denied the truth of the report that his company was about to purchase the P. & O. line of steamers. "There is absolutely nothing in the report. We are doing nicely in our own way, and have no intention of launching out on such a world-wide campaign for control of 'around-the-world' business. You can deny the report in full, was his concluding remark.

## SENATOR LODGE.

Senator Lodge—the dear "Cabot" that once was to the dear "Theodore" that no more is—having recovered from his sore grief, is now about to re-enter the world that is the poorer since he covered his face and sat in the desolation of despair.

Or if that metaphor is a trifle obscure, then let it be known to all men that Mr. Lodge, having been told by his very dear friend, Mr. Roosevelt, that "under no circumstances would he be a candidate for the presidency, and Mr. Lodge presuming to speak to one with a message, it was a blow when Mr. Roosevelt put his hat in the ring and presented himself an unreliable and unworthy friend. Mr. Lodge was so overcome by the shabby trick of which he was the victim that he took no part in the contest between President Taft and Mr. Roosevelt before the Chicago convention—when even the most acute intellect was unable to hazard a guess as to the outcome—and only recovered when the nomination of Governor Wilson put beyond peradventure the result next November. Mr. Lodge is now about to enter the campaign, and he is to preside over the Republican State convention in Boston next month, although when Senator Crane and his allies were battling desperately to hold Massachusetts in line for President Taft Mr. Lodge sat in his box, his hands in his lap, thereby avoiding either to have to turn his thumbs up or down.—Harper's Weekly.

## FINE-FLAVORED CREAM.

The following conditions are necessary to produce fine-flavored cream: The cows should have at all times an abundant supply of pure water to drink. When cows are compelled to drink the water of swamps, muddy ponds or sluggish streams and ditches, in which there is decaying animal matter, including their own droppings, there is a constant men-ace to their health, and unless the cows are in good health, they cannot give first-class milk. Moreover, the mud, often full of foul germs, which collects on the legs, flanks and udders of the cows and falls into the milk at the time of milking, is a direct source of infection. When cows have free access to salt at all times, they will keep in better health, will give more milk, and the cream from the milk will have a better flavor, and keep sweet longer, than when they do not get

any salt, or receive it only at intervals. Cleanliness in the stable is desirable at all times, but especially at milking time the stable should be clean and free from dust. The udders, teats and flanks of the cows should be well brushed before milking. Only bright, clean, tin pails should be used to milk in. Galvanized pails are difficult to keep clean, and bad flavors have been traced to their use.

## ARREST AT TOP OF SPIRE.

CAMDEN, N. J., Oct. 7.—Detective Cheeseman today climbed a church spire, the top of which is two hundred feet above the street and arrested Kephart, a steeplesack who was wanted on a charge of wife desertion, taking his prisoner safely to the ground. Prior to this Kephart had escaped arrest by declining to descend from his lofty perch, and sitting there until the detectives got tired of watching for him, later slipping away in the darkness. Cheeseman was a rigger—before he joined the police force and went right after his man.


