**BOLSHEVIKI SUCCESSSES IN EASTERN SIBERIA**

(Special to The Guardian) PEKIN, April, 7.—The Cossack movement for the preservation of the situation in eastern Siberia has been checked by the recent Bolshevik success at Blagovestchensk. Many Cossacks and others who were disposed to join Semenov or otherwise combine against the Bolsheviks are being deterred for fear of reprisals. The Bolsheviks on the other hand, are elated at the Blagovestchensk victory and are becoming more assertive, especially at Vladivostok, and are now in control practically of the whole country. A few prisoners in the Amur government have been armed, and there seems nothing to prevent their employment wholesale in the Bolsheviks interests.
