There was a large attendance in Zion Church yesterday evening when the pastor, Rev. R. G. Strathie, preached a strong sermon on The Things That We See from the text "While we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen; for the things which are seen are temporal, but the things which are not seen are eternal; II Cor. 4 chap., 18 verses. The speaker said that the stages of long progress might be indicated by noting the things one sees. First, by the eyesight one saw just the primary things of life, the white snow, the green grass, the blue sky, etc. Then the class above that was the insight of the mind when one distinguishes the relationship between objects. He quoted Tennyson's flower in the crannied wall as illustrating the thought that if one knew all relationships he would know what that between God and man is. Higher than the insight of the mind was the voice of the soul when truth, beauty and goodness are apprehended. Jesus said "Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God." It was part of God's great gift to mankind that he showed men how to reach that vision of the soul. After the service Miss Flora Mellichamp acceptably sang "The King of Love My Shepherd is."

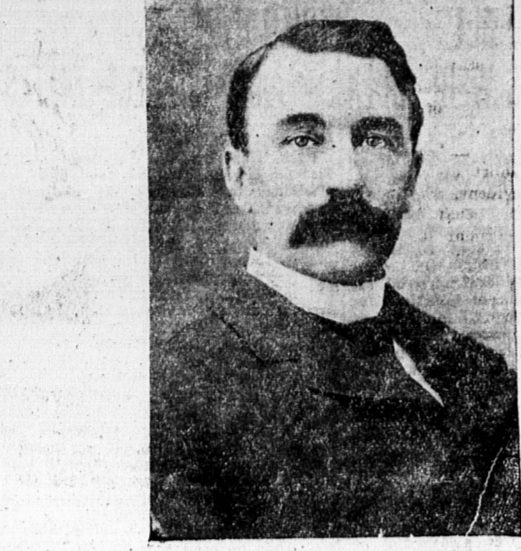

Who Opened the Last Session of the Legislature.

ABBATEMAGGIO TELLS OF MURDERS

VITERBO, Italy, March 28.-The Camorrist informer, Abbatemaggio, was on the witness stand today for five hours, giving testimony against his former associates, who are on trial for the murder of Genaro Cuocolo and his wife. Finally he became so greatly fatigued that he asked for an adjournment of the case, so that he might rest. He was roundly denounced by the furious prisoners in the cage.

Abbatemaggio described at great length his own criminal life, and finally recounted in detail the circumstances leading to the murder of Cuocolo. He said that Nicola Morra had proposed the murder and that Giovanni Rapt had insisted upon not only the murder of Cuocolo, but also Cuocolo's wife, and had put 1,000 francs at the disposal of the assassins, to be certain that there would be no failure. He insisted further that two men he sent to kill the woman, one for the purpose of smothering her cries, as the house in which she resided was directly opposite a police office.

When he became exhausted with his recitals, Abbatemaggio asked President Bianchi for a postponement of the sitting, saying that he was suffering from an injured foot. He promised that he would tell tomorrow how he became acquainted with all the secrets of the Camorra. The excitement, which throughout had been intense, now broke all bounds. The prisoners jumped to their feet and shook their fists at the witness. Rapt called out: "It is not your foot from which you suffer; it is fear."

Nicola Morra exclaimed: "I never saw a greater coward." "He is not a man; he is a phonograph," cried Brucione, the chief of the Camorrist, alluding to a report that a German company had urged Abbatemaggio to permit records of his testimony to be taken. De Marinis shouted: "The phonograph begins to be out of tune."

Abbatemaggio was then led out by a strong guard followed by the curses of the prisoners. Abbatemaggio described a burglary committed by the Camorrist at the home of Count Daquino in Naples, in which he participated. There was a quarrel over the division of the booty, which amounted to \$20,000. The leaders in the Camorra, including Cuocolo, for whose murder the thirty-six prisoners are being tried, Enrico Alfano, the alleged head of the organization, and De Marinis, demanded so large a share of the spoils that none of those who actively participated in the crime received more than \$50. One Camorrist who got nothing denounced the burglars to the police and some of them were imprisoned.

Abbatemaggio in the past three days has received many letters and telegrams congratulating him upon his confession, and he has also been the recipient of many threats. A telegram from Venice assures him of the devoted admiration of a woman whose name betrays her nationality as not Italian. She urges the penitent Camorrist to fly to her as soon as he is free. Other communications are less flattering and some set forth in unpleasant detail what is in store for one who violates his vow as a member of "the beautiful reformed society."

A few correspondents seem bent on making sport of the situation. Then there are the inevitable theatrical propositions. One who describes himself as San Charing, an agent at Milan, offers the informer \$200 a day for the privilege of exhibiting him. Commenting on an offer from an American theatrical agent who offers \$200 a day to exhibit him, Abbatemaggio exclaimed: "Wouldn't it be funny if, after being shut up in a cage like a bird, I should go to America to become a lion?"

TO CONTEST LAST POLAR PRIZE

LONDON, March 28.-Sir Ernest Shackleton, writing to "The Daily Mail" on the race to reach the South Pole, between Captain Scott, the British explorer, and Amundsen, the Norwegian, says that the news received from Christchurch yesterday is interesting in more ways than one. "From the telegram," he says, "one is somewhat at a loss to decide definitely on the two most important points. According to the telegram, Scott landed at Cape Evans, fourteen miles north of the Discovery's winter quarters, and about eight miles south of the winter quarters of my expedition. I know of no Cape Evans in this locality, and can only suppose winter quarters were established on one of the islands about eight miles south of our winter quarters."

"Scott's idea of establishing a depot to the far south is an excellent one. It appears that his ship the Terra Nova followed the Great Barrier until a gale from the southeast forced him to head for Cape Colbeck. This statement is not clear, as a gale from the southeast would be a dead head wind for Cape Colbeck. The ship was stopped by a heavy pack which is the same condition of ice that I found on my expedition in 1907. She then turned along the barrier edge until she reached the Bay of Whales in longitude 164 degrees."

"I now come to the most interesting statement yet made-that the Fram, the vessel of Amundsen's Antarctic expedition, was in the bay and that on board her were eight men and sixteen Greenland dogs and a full equipment for a journey to the Pole."

"The telegram says that stores were landed and a hut erected two miles from the ship, after which the Terra Nova left for McMurdo Sound. It is not therefore clear from the telegram whether the hut and stores were landed and erected by the Terra Nova party or by the crew of the Fram."

"A word here as to the plans of Amundsen. In April, 1909, Amundsen published in "The Geographical Journal" and other papers exhaustive details of his proposed North Pole expedition. He left Norway, ostensibly to proceed via Cape Horn and Bering Strait to the North Polar Basin. On arriving at Madeira in October he announced that he had changed his plans and was going to try to reach the South Pole from that day."

"Nothing more has been heard of Amundsen's expedition until today. We now learn that he landed in an accessible place, evidently with the intention of accomplishing his object."

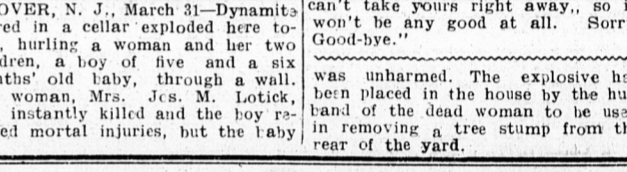

QUEBEC FLOATS FOUR PER CENT, LOAN AT 100 1-2

QUEBEC, March 30.-At a meeting of the civic finance committee tonight the tender of the Bank of Montreal for the new city loan of \$1,050,000 at 100 1-2, payable in London, was accepted. Interest will be at four per cent., payable semi-annually, and a sinking fund is to be created to be deposited semi-annually so that the entire loan will be paid when due, that is, fifty years hence.

DOVER, N. J., March 31.-Dynamite stored in a cellar exploded here today, hurling a woman and her two children, a boy of five and a six months' old baby, through a wall. The woman, Mrs. Jes. M. Lotick, was instantly killed and the boy received mortal injuries, but the baby was unharmed. The explosive had been placed in the house by the husband of the dead woman to be used in removing a tree stump from the rear of the yard.
