IMMIGRATION IN MARCH INCREASED

2,731 Canadians Returned From the United States—Settlers Increased by 4,365.

OTTAWA, April 30.—In March of this year immigration to Canada totalled 6,575, compared with 2,210 in February, an increase of 4,365. For the fiscal year 1924-25 ended March 31st, the total immigration was 111,362, made up of 53,178 from the British Isles, 15,818 from the United States, and 42,366 from other countries.

GIVE PRINCE ROYAL WELCOME

Amid Tremendous Cheering and Booming of Guns, Royal Visitor on Repulse Enters Harbor.

(Special to the Guardian) CAPE TOWN, South Africa, April 30.—The Prince of Wales arrived here today on the battle cruiser Repulse for his visit to South Africa. Table Bay was navigated in a dense fog when a naval escort sailed out to meet the Repulse at 7.30. Thousands gathered on the shore heard the guns of the escort booming the Royal Salute, and shortly afterwards the Repulse escorted by the South African squadron entered the harbor amid tremendous cheering. The Royal Visitor landed at 11 a. m. and drove through miles of cheering crowds to the grand parade, where loyal addresses were presented. A general amnesty of prisoners with the exception of long term convicts and those sentenced to death was declared, thousands being freed in all parts of the country.

BUDGET DEBATE MUST BE CONCLUDED TODAY

(Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, April 30.—The Budget debate must be concluded at the sitting of the House which commences this afternoon, even if that sitting should last into the dawn of the morning or beyond. The members have been advised by their Whips to be and remain on hand for the discussion which will occur on the amendment of the main motion to go into Committee of Ways and Means. No pairs are being accepted by anyone but from present indications the Government will secure a majority of between fifteen and twenty. To secure this it must look to the Progressives and independent as the indications are that the Conservatives will vote solidly for the amendment and against the main motion. Premier King speaks this afternoon and it is expected that he will make some important announcements with regard to matters that have not yet been dealt with in the House. The Prime Minister will follow Mr. Meighen.

Belgium To Form New Cabinet

BRUSSELS, April 30.—Baron Charles De Broqueville, ex-Premier has been asked by King Albert to form a new Belgian Cabinet to succeed that of Premier Theunis, which resigned on April 25th.

Lieut. Governor Todd accompanied by his staff visited the Parliament Buildings at 3 o'clock and from the Throne read a brief speech in which he referred to some of the most important legislation passed during the session and thanked the house for liberal provision, which had been made for public service and then dismissed the members from their sessional duties.

Paavo Nurmi Again Breaking Records

(Canadian Press) LOS ANGELES, April 30.—Paavo Nurmi, the phantom Finn, thrilled 35,000 fans at the track meet in the Coliseum here last night by topping from the thirty year old pedestal T. H. Confield's record of six miles 46 2/5 seconds for one and one half mile runs. He ran the distance in 1:17.17.

First Petitions To Arrive

The voting on the Restricted Area Plan is being taken in a large number of districts throughout the Province during the present week. The honor of being the first to report therefore must be pretty evenly divided between these two districts. Both petitions were fully signed up, the breeders in the two districts being unanimously in favor of the establishment of a Restricted Area. Congratulations are due the residents in these two districts for their splendid response on this important issue.
