SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may preempt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$20 per acre.

Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to cultivate homestead) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$200 per acre. **Duties.**—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500.

C. P. R. TO BUILD ANOTHER BLY GRAIN ELEVATOR AT ST. JOHN.

TORONTO, May 2.—E. W. Beatty, Canadian Pacific Railway solicitor, informed the Dominion Board of Railway Commissioners yesterday of the company's extensive plans to improve its grain-handling facilities to meet the increased demands of the west. The company will this year build a new elevator at St. John, capacity one million bushels; another elevator at Port McNichols, doubling the present storage capacity of 2,000,000 bushels; a new treating house at Fort William.

ORGANS OF DEAD TO REBUILD LIVING.

CHICAGO, April 30.—Miracles of surgery which involve the dismembering of dead bodies to reconstruct the living are declared to be possibilities of the immediate future by Dr. Roswell Park, professor of surgery of the University of Buffalo.

In a paper which dealt with his theories Dr. Park told the American Medical Association how this might be accomplished.

His plan simply is to make practical use of the live organs that remain in the corpse of a man or a woman. Since death may result from violent

heart, for instance—Dr. Park says that the remaining live tissues may be grafted on the body of an injured person with the same hope of success that Burbank exhibits in granting the fura.

In this manner nearly every part of a body with the exception of the de-injury to one organ—the brain or the ceased part, may be used with good effect by practical surgeons.

Teeth, bone, flesh and muscles, he says, may be used in carrying health and renewed life to at least fifty patients by the use of only one body. Countless operations hitherto looked upon as impossible are declared possible in this way.

Doctor Park gives the following as an example of the possibilities of his plan:—

"Let a healthy young woman meet accidental and instantaneous death. It would be possible to use no inconsiderable portion of her body for grafting or other justifiable procedures.

The arteries and nerves could be used, both in the fresh state, and the former even after preservation, for suitable transplantation or repair work on the vascular and nervous system of a considerable number of other people. So also could the thyroid, the cornea, and especially the bones.
