**TUESDAY.**  
The Stanley left here yesterday at 7:10 and arrived at Tormentine at 9:30 with ten passengers, 200 boxes, 100 boxes smelts, 1 horse and about 100 lbs poultry etc. The steamer left Tormentine on return at 11:12 with 7 passengers and 70 bags mail and arrived here at 12:30.

The Stanley made the round trip to Cape Tormentine Saturday reaching Tormentine at 9:30 a. m. and returning to Summerside at 2:40 p. m. There were 13 passengers, 70 packages freight and 40 bags mail going, and five passengers and 187 packages freight coming. No mail was brought this way although a special train left Sackville in the morning and connected with the steamer. The Tormentine special left on return about 10 a. m. in time to connect with the C. P. R. at Sackville. A special train from Charlottetown connected with the Stanley here in the morning and afternoon leaving here on return to the city at 3:15 p. m.

The Civic By-election on Saturday resulted in a victory for H. A. Compton as Mayor, G. M. Reid and Joseph Cox as Councillors. Considering that the election was held on Saturday, a busy day and in the holiday season, the vote was a large one, 533 electors having crossed their ballot. Out of these eleven ballots were spoiled. The vote stood thus:

Many friends will regret that Gilbert DesRoches, Miscouche, met with a painful accident Friday evening. While he and Rev. P. C. Gauthier were driving from English to St. Louis their sleigh slewed when turning a corner and upset, so that Mr. DesRoches was thrown out and badly dislocated his shoulder. Two physicians attended to his injuries and he was able to return home Saturday evening.

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The Stanley made the round trip to Cape Tormentine yesterday returning to Summerside at 12:15, with twelve passengers and the mail. Going in the morning the steamer took 29 passengers, 300 boxes smelts, 56 dressed hogs, 50 pkgs. poultry, etc.

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Fred Campbell was a passenger by the Stanley yesterday from Campbellton to spend a day or two at his home here.

A number of changes have been made in the Winter Fair Building at Amherst which increases the accommodation for exhibits and adds to the comfort of visitors. A busy gang of carpenters have been at work for days putting everything in readiness for the big Fair which opened Monday the 12th inst. In the large auditorium where the evening meetings were held a platform for speakers was erected at a height of about eight feet so that the speaker were heard clearly in the remotest part of the immense amphitheatre.

P. E. I. SPECIAL votes are thus explained by the Montreal Star: Ever since the old days of "land troubles" in Prince Edward Island—a time when there was a landed gentry and a peasant class such as existed in no other part of British America—real estate ownership has been given special treatment. When the Legislative Council was abolished, some years ago, the recognition of real estate was still preserved. Thus, in the House of Assembly of the Island Province, there are two classes of representatives with equal voting power. There are the representatives elected by the voter who has personal or other property—about the same franchise as in the other provinces. Then there are the representatives elected only by the real estate owner. In short, the real estate owners votes for two representatives where the elector without real estate can only vote for one. Mr. Peters was defeated by real estate owners.

J. H. Welch returned by the Stanley yesterday from Regina to spend a few weeks in Summerside.

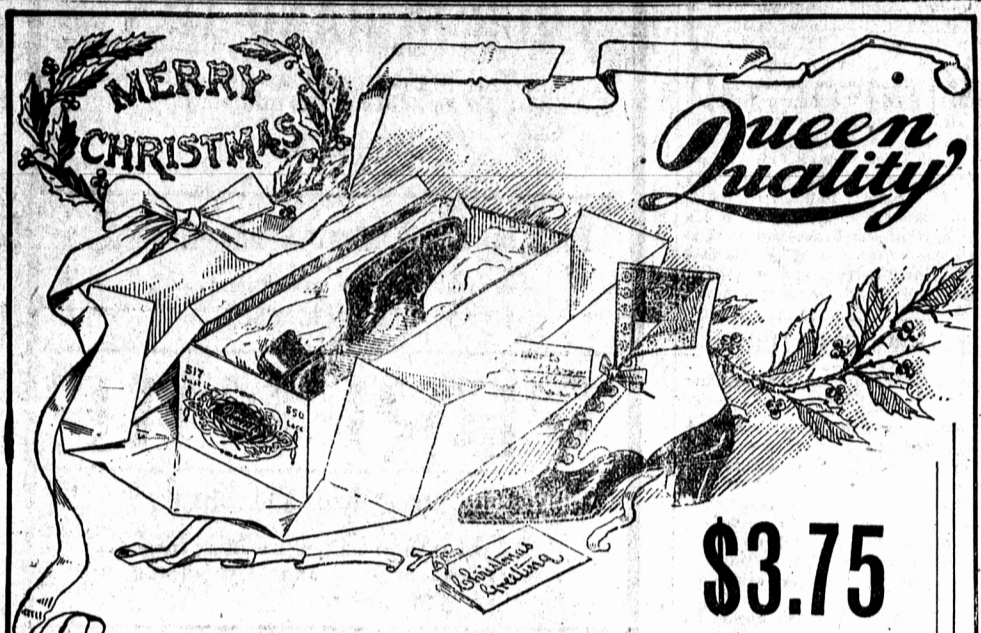
