NEW MARCONI STATION.

SYDNEY, N. S., Sept. 13—Excellent progress is being made with the erection of the new Marconi wireless station and receiving station at Louisburg and it is expected that the new station will be ready by the first of December. The work of taking down the high towers at the Glace Bay station is going on and these will be replaced with smaller steel masts about 20 in number. The old towers, of which there were four, were over 250 feet high and were of great use at first but have not been of use to the company for several years.

Extensions to the powers plant are being made at Glace Bay to assist the new station at Louisburg. At the new station there will be from 25 to 40 operators employed in the operating rooms, sending and receiving. All the power used will be generated with the Glace Bay station and will be transmitted to Louisburg station by means of a relay main line; the keys will all be worked at Louisburg through power generated at Glace Bay station. Manager Woodward states it is quite likely, Signor Marconi will arrive here shortly to inspect the work at his new station.

Louisburg will, when completed, work direct with Poldhu, Ireland, and all ocean-going steamers equipped with the system. There is little doubt that when completed the new Louisburg station will be one of the most powerful and important stations of the Marconi company in North America if not in the world.

WESTERN CANADA POWER COMPANY.

The contracts actually closed by this company to date, amount to 20,291 H. P. for power purposes, and about 950 H. P. for lighting. This is exclusive of contracts now being negotiated, which amount to about another 4000 H. P.

These figures do not, of course, include the pending contract with the British Columbia Electric Co. which is not yet closed, but will probably be on the basis of about 40,000 H. P.

The Vancouver papers state that at a recent meeting of the City Council of Vancouver, the City Clerk was instructed to write to the Western Canada Power Co. to ascertain what lease rent they would be willing to pay per annum for the City car lines and equipments, at the expiration of the present franchise, term at least ten years, present rates to remain in effect. It is not yet known what further action has been taken in this matter.

Trophy to be Raced for in Summerside on Thursday Sept. 19th, 1912



HOLMAN'S MOTOR BOAT TROPHY

This trophy was presented by R. T. Holman, Limited, in 1909 to be contested for each year by fishing boats only. All contesting boats must start together—no handicaps.

The trophy to be held each year by the winner of the year's race, and to be owned by any person winning it three times. The race is open to all fishing boats on the Northumberland Strait. The second prize is a motor boat Head Light, showing red, white and green.

The first race was held in Cape Traverse, in 1909 and was won by the "Edith" owned by Edward McWilliams of Cape Traverse. In 1910 the race was held in Summerside, and was won by the "Bessie M." owned by Edward McPherson of Cape Traverse; it was won in 1911 by the "Bessie Mill," owned by Edward McPherson. This gives Mr. McPherson two wins and if he wins on the above date he will own this trophy.

Each year a silver plate bearing the name of the boat and owner has been attached to the base of the trophy, adding to its value as a prize.

The trophy stands 22 inches high, 18 inches across and weighs nine pounds—is mounted on an ebony base, as the above illustration shows. The design is a very appropriate one, and the finish is beautiful.

This year's race takes place in Summerside on Thursday, September 19th. An invitation is extended to all fishing boats to enter this race. Entries will be received up to the hour of starting—10.45 A. M. by R. T. HOLMAN, Limited, Summerside. 9-16MR11.
