Double Train Service Starts End Of May

Summerside Trade Board Council Pays Tribute To Late D. K. Currie.

A meeting of the Council of the Summerside Board of Trade was held last night in the Town Hall, Mr. R. S. P. Jardine, president in the chair. The chief item to come before the board was a communication from the E. W. MacKinnon, Supt. of the P. E. I. railway, to Mr. B. W. Robinson, chairman of the Transportation Committee, announcing that the double train service would commence on May 30th, and that from June 19th there would be two trips of the car ferry on Sunday and an early morning trip at 7 o'clock, for automobiles each week day, to September 10th. The Board felt that this extra service would be very helpful to the travelling public and greatly appreciated. Mayor Campbell moved that a resolution of condolence be sent to the members of the family of the late D. K. Currie, who was a charter member of the Summerside Board of Trade and was also the first secretary of the board being appointed to that position, when the board was organized in February of 1900, a position he held for many years.

Regret Passing

Mayor Campbell and others present spoke with feeling of regret at the passing of Mr. Currie, who during his residence in Summerside did much for the advancement of the town and took a lively interest in civic affairs. Mayor Campbell said that it was fitting that the Board of Trade and also the town should express in a public manner its regrets at the passing of so honored a citizen.

The chartered members now living and residing in Summerside were associated with Mr. Currie are: Charles Rogers; Judge Saunders; J. A. Brace; A. Sterling MacKay and James A. Morrison.

DRILLING FOR PIRATES' GOLD

cepted by British men-o-war off the Nova Scotia coast.

There was a chance that if he put to sea without incriminating evidence aboard, he might be able to talk himself out of trouble, but if caught with the loot, hanging was certain.

So, the story runs, he buried his treasure on a peculiarly shaped islet he called Plum Island and bore it put out into the Atlantic. The British nabbed him and unsympathetic English judges decided to hang him anyway. Before he was executed his wife was allowed to visit him and to her he told the secret of the Nova Scotia cache.

Attempts Unsuccessful

First known attempt to locate the treasure was in 1883. It was unsuccessful as others since have been.

Because the south coast of Nova Scotia has been settling at the rate of about one inch each year, many of the landmarks supposed to aid treasure seekers had become submerged. The first expedition was not even able to find Plum Island.

The present group began work about a year ago but so quietly did they go about it that not until today did it become generally known. When they struck rock at 38 feet down, they sent for a diamond drill. In charge of it came none other than Billy Bell, one of the heroes of the Moose River disaster.

Forty seven feet down they broke through a rock cavern or tunnel apparently about seven feet high. Then they drilled on 11 feet further into solid rock.

They quit at 65 feet, satisfied they had really had located the cache. They are now waiting for the ice to break up so they can take their scow over to the mainland and bring back an air compressor and other equipment.

FRANCE RUSHES ARMS PROGRAM

Premier Blum Wins Confidence Vote In Chamber.

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)

PARIS, March 17.—Premier Leon Blum's four-day-old cabinet and its \$1,000,000,000 program for swift rearmament won a 389 to 196 vote of confidence tonight in the Chamber of Deputies.

Shortly before facing the Chamber, the cabinet took two steps to hasten arms building. It authorized an extraordinary expense of 4,468,000,000 francs (about \$134,000,000), mostly for new fighting planes, and decided to ask Parliament for additional exceptional armaments credits.

Despite the vote based on setting a date for foreign affairs debate, however, Blum did not emerge from his ministry's first test of power with his lines intact.
