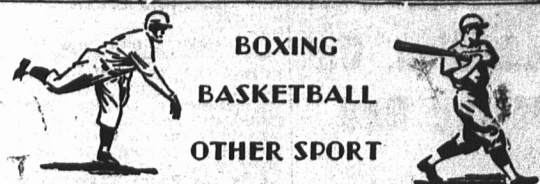

Conn Would Like Shot At Louis' Title

PITTSBURGH, May 15—(AP)—Billy Conn's goal is the heavy-weight championship, and he's heading his campaign in that direction today. The doctors tell him he may win on 15 or 20 rounds after the tonils are out.

"If I can't turn out that way," he beamed, "then I'll have a try at Joe Louis."

Conn, because he is still growing and is reputed to have the best left hand in the boxing business, has been regarded as something of a "white hope" and as the fighter who eventually may beat Louis for the heavyweight crown.

For a time he was a middle-weight, but now he is more of a light-heavyweight. Last Friday he engaged in his last fight against a middleweight, beating Solly Kleiger of Brooklyn.

Billy is actually jubilant about the tonsillectomy. The operation will be on Wednesday and in the meantime the fighter hopes his manager Johnny Ray will arrange a fight with Melio Bettain, recognized in New York as the light-heavyweight champion.

Plans No More Slugging Just Plain "Hits"

CLEVELAND, May 15—(AP)—Roy Weatherly isn't a slugger—any more.

The Cleveland Indians mite outfielder, always a defensive ace, slugged himself out of the American Baseball League once. He won't do it again, he vowed today.

Weatherly, who says he's five feet six inches tall but doesn't look it, is batting .414, fourth in the loop, and is hitting slow curves and left-handed pitching as well as fast balls.

"I quit trying to be a slugger," said Weatherly. "They're not going to slow ball me out of this League any more. Most of my hits will be singles, but I'll get plenty of them."

BUDAPEST, May 15—(AP)—Two additional singles triumphs today gave the Yugoslavian Davis Cup tennis team victory over Hungary in four matches to one.

Franko Puzosic defeated Emil Gabory, 6-1, 6-2, 6-4, and Demeter Miko won over Josef Asboth, 16-year-old star, by 9-7, 2-6, 10-8, 6-3. Yugoslavia thus earned the right to meet Italy in the third round of European zone play.

French Hurls Cubs To 6-2 Victory Over Pirates In Lone National League Tilt

NEW YORK, May 15—The Cubs resumed their winning ways over Pittsburgh Pirates today, trimming the Bucs 6-2 in a National League baseball game behind the six-hit pitching of the veteran Larry French. The victory was the 10th for the Cubs in the last 11 meetings of the clubs.

French was in rare form, retiring 14 of his former teammates in succession from the fourth inning to the ninth. The game gave the league champions six victories against seven defeats for their first long road trip.

Rip Sewell, who blanked the Giants on the Polo Grounds a few

days ago, was hit hard by the Cubs and stepped aside for a pinch-hitter in the sixth. Mace Brown and Russell Bauers finished.

Augie Galan, moved to cleanup position in the batting order, reached first base for his eighth successive time in two games, getting a walk and three singles today.

Bill Herman's double and singles by Jimmy Gleason and Galan gave the Cubs the deciding run in the third. They added three more in the fifth.

The game, played at Pittsburgh, was the only one scheduled.

Royals Rally To Defeat Chiefs

MONTREAL, May 15—(CP)—Montreal Royals shoved across three runs in the eighth inning today to take a 4-1 victory over Syracuse Chiefs in an International Baseball League game.

Art Parks started the late outburst by clouting his seventh home run of the season over the right-field scoreboard with none out. An error by shortstop Ben Sankey, a walk, Leo Norris' single and Marvin Duke's sacrifice fly brought another pair before the side was retired.

Duke was touched for 10 safeties but managed to gain his second win of the season against three losses.

In the only other game played Rochester Red Wings clubbed three Jersey City pitchers for 25 hits to score a lop-sided International League baseball victory over the Junior Giants here today 16-1.

The rampaging Wings drove Bob Carpenter to cover in the third and continued their attack against John Hubbell and Joe Kohlman. Kohlman was nicked for 13 hits, but was allowed to finish the game.

Snooker

Arthur Peterson will play Dan McCallum in a best three out of five series tonight for the championship of the second section of the provincial snooker tournament, by virtue of his win over Eric Lifford last evening, two games to one. Both players were in excellent form with Peterson coming through in the rubber game to win the match.

Richardson Wins Over Claybourne

HALIFAX, May 15—Poker-faced Johnny Lifford retained his Maritime lightweight title here tonight, as he left-jabbed his way to a decision over Martin "Kid" Parsons, Halifax, in a 10-round go at the Arena.

Parsons, former champion and leading contender for Lifford's crown, pressed the champion all the way, sending the Saint John boy to the canvas in the ninth for the only knockdown of the night. Lifford jumped up without a count and fought back to gain an even break on the round.

Lifford won the decision on his right jab as much as on the power of his blows. A swordsman with his left hand, the New Brunswick fighter poured jabs into Parsons as he kept well away from the Halifax boy's dreaded right cross. As it was, Parsons landed three ringing rights on Lifford's chin. In the fourth heat, Lifford's knees buckled as he took a hard right to the chin, but Parsons could not get through with the payoff punch. The judges voted 2-1 for Lifford at the finish.

HAIR-LINE DECISION
HALIFAX, May 15—Southpaw Tommy Claybourne, of Charlottetown, lost a hair-line decision to Garfield "Kid" Richardson of Halifax, at the Arena tonight in a semi-final bout which preceded the Lifford Parsons lightweight title go.

Richardson, also a left-hander, was the aggressor throughout the fight, but it was not until the last of the six rounds that he piled up his slim victory margin. Claybourne seemed content to get his points through counter-punching, this practice netting him plenty of punishment.

At no time during the fight did the two negro boys mix it freely. Richardson weighed 142 1/2, and Claybourne 150.

Yankees Blank Athletics Second Straight Day 3-0; Sox Defeat Senators 9-2

NEW YORK, May 15—(AP)—New York Yankees blanked the Athletics for the second straight day today, winning 3-0 behind the combined five-hit pitching of Wes Ferrell and Johnny Murphy to run their American League Baseball victory streak to five straight.

Ferrell, making his second start of the year was credited with the win, although he had to leave after the seventh inning because of a pain in the elbow. He allowed all five hits made by the A's.

Buck Ross pitched the first five frames for the A's, let in two of the Yankee runs and was charged with his third setback of the year, as the Yankees maintained their game-and-a-half lead in the League race.

In the only other game scheduled Fritz Ostermeier held the Senators to eight hits today while Boston pounded four Washington pitchers for a 9-2 American League baseball victory.

The Red Sox hopped on southpaw Ken Chase, Washington starting hurler, for four hits and many runs in two innings. Then they hammered out five more runs off Bud Thomas and Pete Appleton. Walter Masterson held the last inning.

The Senators were pitched unles until the eighth when they scored once. They added another in the ninth. Joe Vosmik paced Boston's attack with four hits, including a double and a triple.
