Magnesium Deficiency In Potatoes

A threatened serious disorder in Prince Edward Island potatoes this season, due to magnesium deficiency, is warned against by the Dominion Laboratory of Plant Pathology here. The following statement has been issued, outlining the best corrective measures: Farmers in the province may have noticed a peculiar yellowing of the potato plants during the past few days. The trouble has been diagnosed as Magnesium deficiency, a disorder brought on when the supply of this chemical element leaves the leaves of the infected plants are very much lighter in colour than the green of healthy plants, the larger leaves being the first to show this symptom.

Musso's Last Hours In Power

MADRID, July 27 (AP)—Travelers arriving by plane from Rome today declared that Benito Mussolini fell because he supported the German plan to abandon central and southern Italy for a strong defence line in the north, and that he now is at a villa between Rome and Milan. It was said, however, that Marshal Pietro Badoglio insists that all of Italy must be defended if Italy plans to remain a neutral nation. The Germans have been forced to agree, they declared. Hitler had first proposed a strong stand behind the Po valley and Mussolini, seeking to do his bidding, was overruled by the Fascist Grand Council by a vote of 19 to 8, it was asserted. Carlo Scorza, Fascist Party secretary, was reported under preventive arrest, with others of 11 Duce's collaborators confined to their homes. On the issues of defence of all Italy, Badoglio for the moment at least has the support of the army and the Crown, both of which enjoy tremendous popular prestige as successors to Mussolini, this latter account of the crisis in Rome.

WINNIPEG, July 27 (CP)—At least five and possibly six candidates will seek election to the House of Commons in the two federal by-elections in Selkirk, Red River, Manitoba, and Humboldt constituency, Saskatchewan, Aug. 9. In Humboldt, two members of the provincial legislature, Joseph W. Burton, C.C.F. of Humboldt, and Frank S. Krenn, Liberal, of Bruno, Sask., were officially nominated. A three-cornered contest was assured in the Selkirk constituency which will elect a successor to Hon. T. Thorson who has been appointed to the Exchequer C. of Canada. C.E.
