Stock Markets At A Glance

WINNIPEG, July 13 (CP)—Rye trading was again light on the Winnipeg grain exchange with little interest shown and dealings confined largely to commission houses and local prices were irregular.
MONTREAL, July 13 (CP)—Trading trends on average took a downward slant on the Stock Exchange and Curb Markets though some strong spots developed and there, notably in textiles. All indexes were lower except paper which scraped through unchanged.
NEW YORK, July 13 (AP)—Selected stocks tipped the market scales on the recovery side today but many leaders were unable to attain any real come-back balance. Activity was rather slack from the start, except for several low-priced issues. Commonwealth and southern was the liveliest performer.
LONDON, July 13 (CP)—Stocks closed firm today after an active trading session. Industrials registered widespread gains, with home rail issues firm. Oils were higher. Internationals quiet and British funds firm.
CHICAGO, June 13 (AP)—Wheat futures, after trading in a narrow range in an unsettled market, sagged under the weight of late bidding sales today and prices were off as much as 3/4 cent. Prices had rallied shortly before the close when commission houses stepped in to buying side, but the advance brought forth increased offerings.

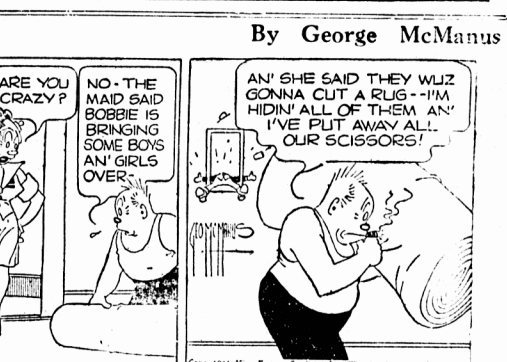

Re Marketing Heavy Sows

The situation, in regard to the marketing of sows, has developed into a problem. There is no demand for them from the trade, and cold storage facilities have become so glutted up with the product that Packing Plants find it necessary to call a halt until some of the stock on hand can be liquidated. Consequently, the Livestock Marketing Board will not accept sows for shipment until the week of July 31st. During that week arrangements will be made to accept all the sows offered, but the chances are, they will have to be re-loaded at some central shipping point and sent through to Montreal in straight carloads of sows.

Following this, it is probable another recess period must be observed before a further shipment be undertaken. Farmers who have sows to dispose of, are in the unfortunate position of having a product for which there is no demand at the moment and the Marketing Board is endeavouring to solve the problem as best it can.

We trust farmers will understand the situation and co-operate with us along the lines suggested in this letter. War conditions may change at any time, when there will be an outlet for every thing we will have to sell, in the liberated countries.
