Medical Science Finds New Cure
(By STEPHEN J. MCDONOUGH, Asst. Ated Press Staff Writer)
WASHINGTON, Aug. 21—(AP)—A new treatment for gonorrhea, claimed to be highly successful, was announced today by a Louisiana public health service officer.

By the simple use of a weak solution of the chemical, known as the commonest industrial chemical, it has been possible to treat even advanced cases quickly and surely, according to Dr. Charles E. Verdier, Medical Director of the Public Health Institute of New Orleans.

Writing in the "Military Surgeon," Dr. Verdier said many thousand injections of hydrochloric acid have been made into veins and muscles in the past three years for "every conceivable type of gonococcal infection in men, women and children." "In no case has there been a failure to achieve curative results and, moreover, there has never been an unfavorable reaction in our observation," he added.

Some physicians contend that, if additional work confirms the findings of Dr. Verdier, medicine will be given a new treatment rivaling sulfanilamide in its efficiency.

No General Conflict This Year Believes League Official

VANCOUVER, Aug. 21—(CP)—Dr. Mack Eastman, former professor at the University of British Columbia staff now holding a high post in the League of Nations, believes there will not be a general war this year "unless Hitler makes a mistake".

Dr. Eastman is chief of the extra-European section of the International Labor Office, an affiliate of the League. Before accepting his appointment in 1925, he was head of the Department of History of U. B. C.

It is the best informed opinion to drop the world's only kind of triumph Hitler can afford is a bloodless triumph—like he had in Austria. He will not fight a war if he can help it. But all that is qualified by his impulsive, erratic mind, which might decide him to do anything.

Asked if he believed in the League and if it could be revived Dr. Eastman told interviewers: "We are at a low ebb but do not believe the idea of international co-operation will ever be allowed to drop. The world's great need is a powerful league. Its revival will come when Britain and France and like-minded nations are prepared to agree beforehand to stand together against an aggressor."

TORONTO, Aug. 22—(CP)—Traders lost interest in the Toronto stock market today and session to close lower. The index stocks drifted through a listless for western oils was the only one to show improvement. Senior golds lost early gains and eased with juniors and base metals. The industrial list lacked a rallying point and softened. Volume of 423,000 shares was the lowest since mid-June.

Granada, a gold prospect, made the best showing in the gold list by spurring 2 3/4 points to 13 for a new 1938 high. Ashley advanced 2 1/2 to 10. Gilles Lake eased a point to 16 on turnover of 49,700 shares. Bigdog, Hard Rock, Paymaster, McKenzie and McWatters advanced a point each while MacLeod, Sliden, Preston and Powell dropped a couple.

Waite Amulet continued last week's drop by dropping five to 5.35 in the base metal list. Smelters and Noranda eased 1/2 and Falconbridge pushed up 15 to 6.00. Nickel eased 3/8 to 49 3/8. McColl preferred, up 1/2 at 99 1/2 was the only gainer among big oils. Utilities and liquors were irregular and foods unchanged to lower.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD

SUMMER SUNSETS



Silhouettes against the sunset make striking snapshots.

SUMMER'S gorgeous sunsets are splendid snapshot material, and sunset pictures are easy to take, whether you have a simple box camera or a high-grade folding camera with ultra-fast lens.

Charming silhouettes of persons can be made with the sunset as a background, and sunset shots across a lake or stream, with reflections, are remarkably beautiful. The effect of a sunset is heightened by a good foreground, such as a "frame" of trees or overhanging leafy branches.

In the country, try shooting the sunset with a piece of farm machinery silhouetted against it. A plowing scene, with straining horses silhouetted against the sunset sky, makes a successful snapshot.

One of the most important points in picturing sunsets, is to obtain a strong, vigorous cloud effect. Good clouds are often better than a lot of brilliant color, at least for black-and-white picture purposes. In many cases, a more striking result will be obtained if you place a color filter over the camera lens. The filter brightens its own colors, and darkens its opposite or complementary colors. When in doubt, shoot one picture with the filter and one without. A good sunset is worth an extra shot or two.

Either chrome type or panchromatic film is excellent for sunset pictures. Short exposures are desirable, in order to subdue detail in the foreground. If yours is a box camera, which has a choice of lens openings, use the smaller opening. With rapid-lens cameras, try an exposure of 1/16 at 1/50 or 1/100 second. If the sunset is quite bright, and you are shooting across water, you may use an opening as small as f.22.

Watch the sunsets—keep your camera loaded—ready for action—and you will add many a charming snapshot to your collection.
