MR. JOSEPH PIERCE DOYLE Well known in Catholic circles at St. Boniface, Man, Joseph Pierce Doyle, St. Boniface, died of heart failure on Oct. 9. Born in Summerside, P. E. I., fifty-seven years ago, he went to Winnipeg in 1910. In 1915 he married Margaret Jane King and took up residence in St. Boniface where they since resided. He is survived by his widow, two sons, Cpl. James Edward Doyle, R.C.A.F. now at St. Thomas, Ont., and Francis Patrick Doyle, at home, and two daughters also at home, Mary and Catherine. MIRACLE BILL SAYS



I don't get to read a lot, but yesterday down at the feed store I had to wait a few minutes. So I picked up a poultry bulletin. The first headline sounded crazy. It said: "A hen will not lay half an egg." Does that make sense? Well, it did to me . . . later. It seems that when we just feed hens grain and grits, we don't give'em all the things they need to produce eggs at top speed. They can develop the yolks fast enough. But not the whites. And since a hen will not lay half an egg she slows up the yolk development till the whites are ready. Well, I used to get only eighty eggs per hen a year when I fed my flock grain and grits. Now that I give them "Miracle" Laying Mash—with all the things they need to make all parts of the egg at higher speed, I get around a hundred and sixteen eggs per year for each hen. The iodine in that feed helps hens get the calcium out of their feed to make more egg shells.

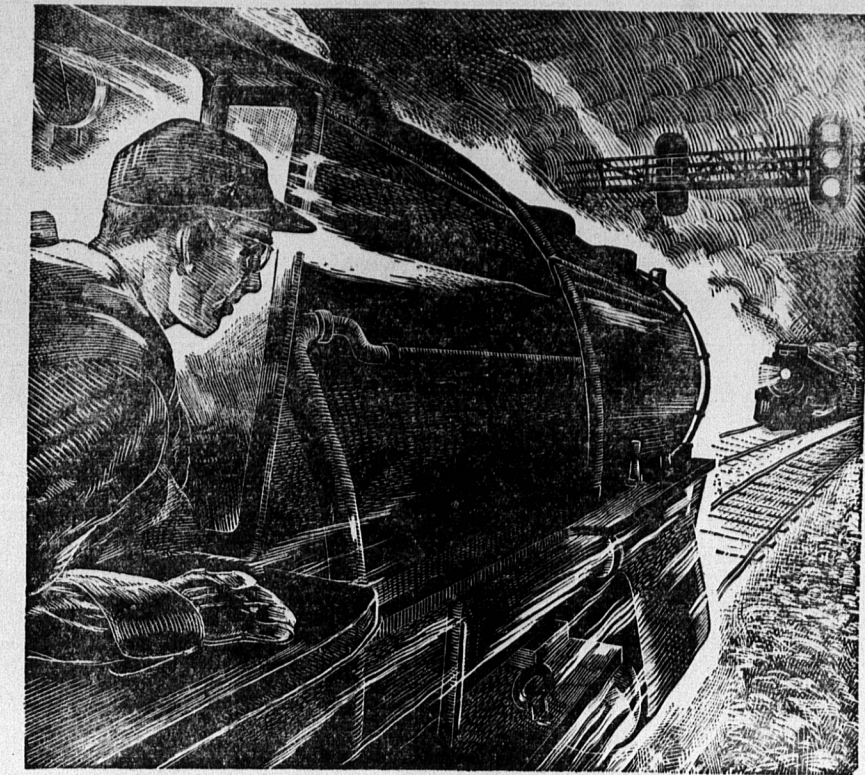
