MURDEROUS FISH - Individual bluefish are credited with having destroyed 1,000 other fishes in one day.

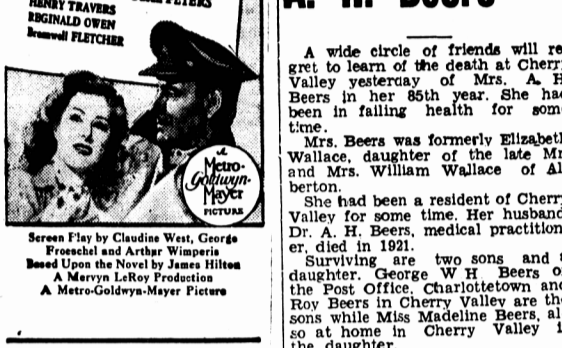

SERIOUS PROBLEMS FACING AGRICULTURE EMPHASIZED AT FREDERICTON MEETING

Serious problems facing the farmers of this Province were emphasized in the following address delivered by President J. J. Trainor at the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Federation of Agriculture on Thursday.

"In my mid-winter report during farmers week," said Mr. Trainor, "I gave a summary of the problems that have received the attention and action of your Executive Officers."

"I am not going to refer to local or Provincial matters that have been referred to your Federation at this time. In my humble opinion, questions of a National scope are affecting our farmers."

"In a time like this when we are all engaged in an all out effort, we must endeavor to avoid all useless controversial discussion. This should not mean, however, that we are to refrain from airing and trying to adjust some of the many disabilities and inequalities from which we suffer."

"In order to secure our proper share of the National income and all other benefits that are properly due us as farmers, the organization is the only means by which those changes in our comparative status can be brought about."

"I regret to say that owing to the Provincial condition we were unable to send a representative to the Canadian Federation of Agriculture Convention at Calgary last year."

"The prosperity of our farmers is dependent, for the most part, on the policies and actions of our Dominion Government. Struggling individuals or as isolated groups in each Province is absolutely of no avail."

"The need for a strong National farm organization, representing the farmers of all Provinces and all farm industries in Canada is absolutely necessary if we hope to share in some of the good things of the time to which we believe we are entitled."

"The Canadian Federation of Agriculture has been giving our farmers very valuable assistance during the past year, that I am sure is not fully realized, and consequently not appreciated."

"In conclusion I beg to pledge every support to my successor and ask for him every assistance and cooperation of the incoming Executive."

Secretary's Report - Activities of the P.E.I. Federation of Agriculture were reviewed in the following report presented at Thursday's annual meeting of the organization by the secretary, Mr. W. R. Shaw.

"A delegation representing the Federation of Agriculture and composed of J. J. Trainor, President, and Mr. J. H. Gillies and Mr. W. R. Shaw met with the members of the Provincial Legislature during the session in March, and there presented resolutions forwarded for attention to the Federation from member bodies, and also discussed with the Legislature other matters of importance to Agriculture."

"In addition to this most unfavourable financial condition, I would now ask you to compare the long hours of labour which the farmer, his wife and family are compelled to work in order to maintain a mere subsistence level."

"The industrial worker usually receives much greater financial returns for an eight hour day."

"The other comforts that are not available to most of our farmers, such as running water, electricity, bath tubs and toilet facilities, electric light and telephone services. Surely our wives and daughters are entitled to all these modern conveniences."

"I maintain that a lack of these creature comforts is largely responsible for driving many of our splendid young boys and girls off the farms and out of our Province."

"With a fair financial return for our farm produce, those who are made available to all our people."

"I confess to a certain amount of hesitation in making such comparisons as it might tend to encourage more of our splendid young boys and girls to leave our country homes."

"How are we to bring the youth of this Province who have gone forth to fight our battle for freedom on the land and sea, in the wholehearted cooperation of the various war industries throughout our Provinces than our own?"

"It simply cannot be done unless we who are left behind benefit every energy in making our rural life more attractive."

"I feel it is the grave responsibility of our Provincial Federation of Agriculture in co-operation with our splendid group of Women's Institutes, our several Credit Unions, our Co-operative Enterprises, and all other rural community organizations, to join hands in an honest effort to make rural life more attractive."

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ANNUAL MEETING OF P. E. ISLAND MEDICAL ASS'N

At the morning session Dr. W. McBride, Kensington, presided and at the afternoon session, Dr. E. S. Giddings, Charlottetown, presided.

Medical problems were discussed at the morning session. Dr. D. Scater Louis, Montreal, President of the Canadian Medical Association, and Dr. T. C. Rouley, Toronto, Secretary of the Canadian Medical Association, as guest speakers at luncheon, spoke on the Canadian Medical Association.

A clinical one and papers were presented by Dr. Roscoe Graham, Toronto, on "Carcinoma of Caecum and Left Colon," Dr. Kenneth MacKenzie, Toronto, on "Extruded Intervertebral Disc," Dr. F. W. Tidmarsh, Charlottetown, on "The New Born Period," Dr. J. H. MacNeil, Charlottetown, on "Anesthesia in the Prince Edward Island Hospital," Dr. D. Scater Louis, on "Indications for Digitalis Therapy."

After being read these papers were discussed. About 38 medical doctors were at the meeting.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday afternoon from Christ Church, Cherry Valley.
