The bride was attired in white flat crepe with rhinestone trimmings and wore a veil. She entered the room, on the arm of her father, while the wedding march was played by Miss Jessie Cook. The couple stood under a white arch and the ceremony was performed by Rev. T. R. Goudge. Miss Cook played "O Perfect Love, while the register was being signed. A large number of guests were present and a sumptuous supper was served after the marriage.

**Would Exterminate Japanese Bandits**

TOKYO, Dec. 19.—(AP)—A renewed and more extensive drive to exterminate Chinese bandits in Manchuria was announced by the Japanese war office on the grounds of increasing peril to the South Manchuria railway.

This move was made on the strength of a Rengo New Agency dispatch from Tientsin saying that the situation in the Chinchow area had become so grave that Japanese residents in Shanhalkwan had decided to evacuate the city and go to China proper. Another report said one Japanese and 14 Chinese had been killed in a new skirmish. Marshal Chang Hueseh-Liang has enrolled a large number of "soldier-bandits" in his army, a war office note said, increasing his forces at various points in the Chinchow area to approximately 100,000. The hope was expressed that he would withdraw his army within the Great Wall in view of the new campaign.

As for Japan itself, a sweeping shakeup among prefectural governors and high officials of the home ministry was a king place as a part of the Seiyukai party's consolidation of its position preparatory to facing minority difficulties in the approaching diet session.

**N. B. Potatoes For The Cuba Market**

HARTLAND, N. B., Dec. 19.—(By The Canadian Press)—A much keener demand in Cuba this year for New Brunswick seed potatoes, of government certified grade, is seen in a large order received from that country by a Grand Falls potato-shipping firm. In previous years, orders have been received the first week in January, or later in the months, and the present earlier order is taken as a good indication of increased demand.

A federal potato inspector has been stationed at Hartland to supervise the loading of 100 railway cars with the tubers.

The remainder of the shipment, which is expected to total between 18,000 and 21,000 bags of 150 pound each, will be secured that the steam car taking the tubers to Cuba will sail from Saint John the latter part of December.

It is expected that two or more shipment of New Brunswick potatoes will leave Saint John, for Cuba before the last of January.

**FEATHERBLOWN COIFFURE AND PLATINUM BANDEAU**

LONDON, Dec. 19.—Women have decided to be featherblown instead of windswept.

The featherblown coiffure is the latest development of the windswept style, and is taking London by storm. In one West End salon from 30 to 40 women a day are having their hair dressed in this new way.

Featherblown hair is described by its originator as sleek, tapered close to the head all round, and curls against the head, not the cheek, like a cap of tiny coq feathers. It is so short that it is almost impossible for it to become unruly. It never loses its look of "tidy untidiness," although it is only reset every ten days.

"It is all a matter of setting," an expert explained. "The hair which is the most suited to the style is the lank lank, straight hair which we used to consider the most intractable. Thicker hair requires a great deal of tapering, or cutting out, while the owner of naturally curly hair must be content to be curl-blown—the same sleek style, but with more wave in it."

A platinum streak or a platinum bandeau completes the most chic featherblown coiffure. The bandeau is the newest craze. The hair is parted at one side, and another parallel parting made an inch and a half lower down.

LONDON, Dec. 19.—Queen Mary went into the densely populated east end area of Whitechapel, and opened the Salvation Army's hostel for homeless women, constructed in a disused school building.
