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## C.C.L. PLANS TO CLEAR COMMUNISTS FROM RANKS

### Pat Sullivan Head of C.L.S.U. Is Assaulted

MONTREAL, July 21 (CP)—Three men said by police to be members of the Canadian Seaman's Union were arrested tonight following two attacks within a half-hour on J. A. (Pat) Sullivan, leader of the Canadian Lake Seamen's Union in the waterfront district.

The second attack occurred while police were escorting Sullivan and John Chapman, another officer of the Sullivan-headed union to a safe in an effort to identify the men who had administered the first beating.

The three arrested gave their names as: Frank Henry, 20, Joe Davis, 51, and Frank Dauby, 22. All were charged with disturbing the peace by fighting in the street although it was reported that Sullivan might lay additional charges later.

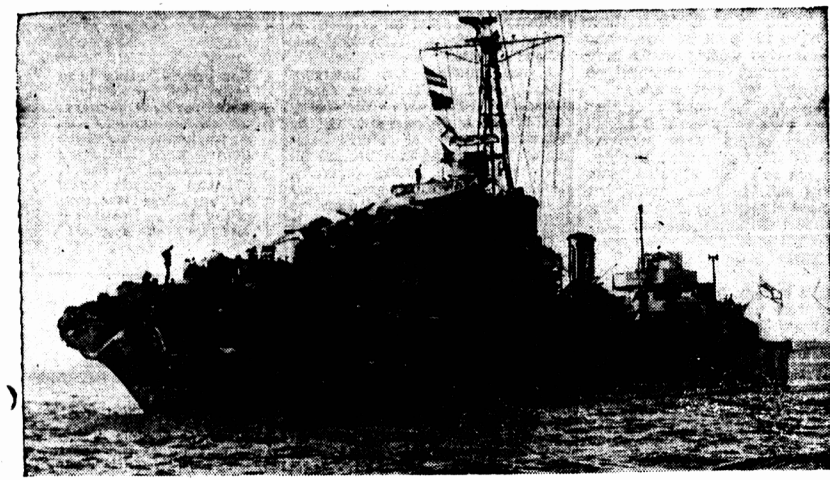

### Micmac Limp Into Halifax Harbor

### Micmac Inquiry Stands Adjourned

HALIFAX, July 21 (CP)—The Transport Department's preliminary inquiry into last Wednesday's collision between the destroyer Micmac and the freighter Yarmouth County was adjourned today but Capt. A. W. Hilton of Yarmouth, N. S., presiding, said it might be reconvened later.

Capt. Hilton said he had completed taking evidence from crew members of the freighter and had asked the Department if Navy personnel should give evidence. Pending a reply from Ottawa the inquiry was adjourned.

The Navy has also held a court of inquiry into the accident, worst in the peacetime history of the Canadian Navy, but the evidence in both courts has been heard in private.

Death toll in the collision is 11, including six dead and five missing, all members of the destroyer's crew.

### Two Men Critically Injured In Accident

Vernon Lee, 18, of Charlottetown, suffering from concussion, was still unconscious yesterday evening at the Prince Edward Island Hospital and Elmer Smith of Webster's Corner, with internal injuries and shock remained in a serious condition at the Charlottetown Hospital as the result of a collision between a Prince Edward Island Libraries truck and the Murray Harbour train.

The accident occurred about 9:40 yesterday morning at the Millview crossing.

Two others, Mrs. Grace Campbell and Miss Alberta Bryant both of Charlottetown who also were riding in the truck at the time were less seriously hurt. They are at the Charlottetown Hospital.

It is understood the Library truck was proceeding east to Annandale when it was hit by the Diesel-powered eastbound train. The force of the impact threw the truck across the tracks and caused it to knock down a railway switch before it careened from a telephone post and finally came to rest about ten feet from the tracks on the east side.

Lee, who it is understood, was riding in the rear of the truck, was thrown through the roof a distance of 32 feet into a nearby grain field. Miss Bryant was said to have been found lying on the ground directly behind the truck. The other two, Smith and Miss Campbell were found trapped in the front seat.

The Library truck was proceeding to Annandale to move library supplies to Souris when the accident occurred.

### Two Women Less Seriously Hurt: Train And Truck In Collision At Millview

HALIFAX, July 21 (CP)—An increase of one half cent a gallon in the price of gasoline sold by Imperial Oil Ltd., to Nova Scotia motorists was forecast today as the Public Utilities Board granted the boost at the wholesale level.

It was expected the increase would be passed on to the consumer because retailers said their spread was insufficient for them to absorb any of the higher price. The decision is effective August 1 and, if and when, the increase is passed to the consumer most Nova Scotia motorists will pay 38 cents a gallon for grade 1 gasoline and 34 cents for grade 2.

### Reveal Records on Wallace's Magazine

WASHINGTON, July 21 (AP)—The House of Representatives committee on un-American activities asked a witness on Communist activities today for his records on "The New Republic" magazine, of which Henry A. Wallace is editor.

The witness, Walter S. Steele, chairman of the national security committee of the American Coalition of Patriotic Civic and Fraternal Societies, said he would be "glad" to supply them.

Questioned by Rep. Karl E. Mundt (Rep.-S.D.), Steele said the New Republic is financed almost 98 per cent by foreign capital, and that Wallace "appears to be the mouthpiece" for the Progressive Citizens of America. He alleged this organization to be a reorganization of "political Red fronts" intended to penetrate other political parties or to launch a third party.

Replying to Steele's testimony, Michael Straight, publisher of The New Republic, said in a statement in New York:

"These are stale charges which have been brought up repeatedly and which have been repeatedly disproved. Representative J. Parnell Thomas must have heard that The New Republic is about to print an article about him."

Rep. Thomas (Rep. U.J.) is head of the un-American activities committee.

### \$200,000 Fire In Ont. Co-operative

SUNDERLAND, Ont., July 21 (CP)—Loss was estimated at between \$150,000 and \$200,000 tonight in a fire that raged in the quarter acre farmer's co-operative buildings. Just completed today, Sunderland is about 35 miles northeast of Toronto.

A Aylsworth, manager of the co-operative, who made the estimate of the loss, said the one-storey wooden buildings and the grain elevators were a total loss.

Firemen fought off a threat to the Canadian National Railway station, the station house and railway freight cars. One car caught fire and was lost. Leonard Oldfield, a baker in the town, said the fire started in a hot box in a motor at the top of the elevator shaft.

Mr. Clark's nomination was moved by W. L. McEachern, Mermaid, and seconded by O.W. Newson, Brackley.

Mr. Cullen's nomination was moved by Charles Ellis, Dunstaff, seconded by Joseph Doyle, Mt. Herbert, and supported by Mr. Lemuel Jay.

Included among those who spoke at the Convention were Premier Jones, Hon. G. H. Harbour Attorney General F. A. Large, Hon. Thomas Cullen, Speaker of the Legislature, Mr. Ducaid MacKinnon, and Mr. J. L. Douglas, M.P.

No other names were brought before the Convention.

### Colonial War In Indonesia Continues

BATAVIA, Java, July 21 (AP)—Netherlands planes blasted Indonesian airfields in Java and Sumatra today, and President Sukarno said the military republic said Dutch military units was attacking by land, sea and air.

The Dutch, claiming their military forces were taking "police action" against the republic, used Tomatoes to lay down their arms.

Republican officials accused the Dutch of starting a full-scale "colonial war." Indonesian troops were ordered to "counter-attack" wherever they were attacked.

### Three Killed In Train-Truck Crash

BADEN, Ont., July 21 (CP)—Three young men were killed today when a Canadian National Railway's mail train crashed into the side of a light truck in which they were travelling within the limits of this village, 11 miles east of Kitchener.

Killed were Glen Schwartzgruber, 14; Ray Snider, 12; and Ernest Roth, 22 all of Baden.

### Brazilian Aviator Dies

JAV, Brazil, July 21 (AP)—Joao Ribeiro de Barros, noted Brazilian aviator, died here last night. In 1927 he made the first flight by a South American pilot across the South Atlantic, flying from Rome to Brazil.

### Council To Press For Full Explanation From Water Commission

Decision to press for an unequivocal answer from the chairman of the City Water Commissioners to the City Council's written request of July 17 that information be furnished it respecting the recent breakdown in the City's water supply was unanimously expressed at a special meeting of the City Council last night.

All Councillors except Coun. N. W. Lowther who was absent from the meeting were in their seats when His Worship, Mayor B. Earle MacDonald opened the meeting by reading a letter dated July 18, which the City Clerk had received from Mr. J. A. Webster, chairman of the commissioners of sewers and water supply (This letter and other relevant correspondence on the question appears elsewhere in this issue).

City Councillor W. R. LePage said he considered the letter a "direct insult to the City Council."

Coun. F. C. Dougan—"The way I look at it, gentlemen, is that we are elected by the people of Charlottetown to run their civic business. It seems to me, therefore, that since we are responsible to them for all that takes place in the City affecting their welfare, that we should have a clear-cut, definite statement on this water question from the Water Commissioners."

Coun. J. D. Stewart: "I agree heartily with Coun. Dougan's remarks."

Coun. J. G. MacDonald: "I certainly do also. The citizens are entitled to know just what caused the recent breakdown and also to have some reassurance that such occurrences do not occur again if their avoidance is physically possible."

### Fog Delays Search For Missing Plane

HALIFAX, July 21 (CP)—Search and rescue craft were standing by here tonight waiting for a coastal fog to lift and enable them to resume the search for two missing naval aviators who disappeared in their biplane Thursday 40 miles east of here off Nova Scotia's rugged eastern shore.

The fog which has hung over the area for more than a week closed in today as the R. C. A. F. was to send eight planes to join two naval vessels and fishermen who have been searching ever since the plane failed to return from a homing exercise.

### 90,000 Jews Placed Under House Arrest

JERUSALEM, July 21 (AP)—British authorities placed 90,000 Jews in most parts of Jerusalem under dusk to dawn house arrest today as a new wave of terror gripped the Holy Land.

The night began with a new outbreak of violence when a jeep was blasted from the highway at Haifa. Three British soldiers and a Jewish interpreter were injured seriously. The jeep was carrying a loudspeaker system announcing curfew instructions to residents.

With a quarter of its Jewish population under 10-hour nightly curfew—in Haifa, Jerusalem and Nablus—the Holy Land was more tense than in many months.

One of the latest incidents was the attempted sabotage of the Iraq Petroleum Company's pipeline near Haifa on the historic plains of Esdraelon. Only sparse details were available, but a Government announcement five hours after the incident said eight Jews had been arrested.

Explaining the new and greater security precautions, authorities said the Jewish underground had three separate "excuses" for new acts of violence.

Foremost among these was the mystery, so far as Jews are concerned, of the whereabouts of three deportation ships bearing the 4,500 passengers of the former Chesapeake Bay ferry, President Warfield, intercepted near the Egyptian coast Friday.

Other reasons for Jewish retaliation were the hanging sentences still pending against three Irgun men convicted in the Acre Prison raid of May 7, and the disappearance and presumed death two months ago of the Stern Gang member, Alexander Rubowitz. Rubowitz may have met his end at the hands of a special police group which took revenge on its own initiative.

### New Bombshell In Ranks of Canadian Labor

OTTAWA, July 21 (CP)—A showdown with Communists within its ranks was declared tonight by the Canadian Congress of Labor.

Suggesting that Reds within the Union have been playing ball with the allegedly Communist-dominated United Textile Workers of America (A.T.U.), the Congress declared it was demanding "an immediate stop to this disloyalty."

This disclosure came about three months after J.A. (Pat) Sullivan, secretary-treasurer of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, had resigned that job and his presidency of the Canadian Seaman's Union (C.S.U.) on the ground the C.S.U. was dominated by Reds.

The Sullivan resignation and concurrent disclosures of Communism within Canadian labor ranks was labor's biggest bombshell in years, but the C.C.L. announcement tonight ran second to it.

While the Congress announcement was couched in guarded terms, it gave sure confirmation to spectators current for some months

### Argentine Plane Crashes, 17 Dead

Buenos Aires, July 21 (CP)—The Argentine Government announced today that 17 persons, eight of them civilians, were killed when a Douglas DC-4 military transport crashed while taking off from El Palomar military airfield here.

Previous unofficial estimates had placed the death toll at as high as 50.

The plane crashed as it became airborne and smashed into a crowd of spectators lining the edge of the field to watch Argentine Air Force manoeuvres.

### Everything O. K. On Plane After Trouble

HALIFAX, July 21 (CP)—A westbound Constellation aircraft on a trans-Atlantic flight tonight reported "everything ok" after sending out a message earlier reporting one of its four engines was out and three were running "rotten."

The second message, relayed to the R.C.A.F.'s Search and Rescue Unit here, said the trouble had been due to short circuits and the plane was proceeding normally towards the Newfoundland airport at Gander from Shannon, Eire.

The position of the plane, as given in the first message, would have placed it about 650 miles east of Gander.

Search and Rescue said it had no information on the number of passengers or the airline except that it was "American."

### CHILD DROWNED

SAINT JOHN, N.B., July 21 (CP)—Lela Rosemary Hamer, 11-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hamer of Floral Park, New York, drowned in the Keenebecus River near here yesterday. The young victim, who could not swim, had been wading and drowned in deep water before help could reach her.
