TEMPERATURE DROPS SLIGHTLY - Temperature in Prince Edward Island dropped slightly yesterday as the thermometer in Charlottemtown reached a maximum of 83 degrees, but no end to the fortnight of dry and hot weather has been seen last night. The hot spell reached a high of 87 degrees last Friday and the weekend saw hundreds seek the shade of parks and coolness of the seashore.

INJURED IN COLLISION - Laurence Myers of Mt. Allison was injured last night when a car he was driving was in collision with one driven by Dr. J. E. Corrigan of Charlottemtown. The accident took place about a half mile east of Mt. Allison corner. Myers was taken to the residence of Mr. Mark Horton, nearby. He was unconscious when taken from the car but his condition was not considered serious. However, he would not be moved until today at least. It was learned, both cars were badly damaged. Mounted Police said heavy dust obscured vision where the accident occurred.

The car, owned by a commercial man, was left unlocked. Local car owners have been warned repeatedly not to leave their cars unlocked and strangers should receive a similar warning from the management of hotels or boarding houses with whom they are stopping.

POLICE COURT - At the Police Court yesterday two Excise cases, illegal possession of spirits, were further adjourned. A female defendant in an assault case was fined \$20 and costs or thirty days in jail. A drunk and incapable, first offence, was fined \$30.00 and costs or five days jail and a second offence, who was still "under the influence" and unable to appear in court was remanded until today.
