

Teachers Convention at New Haven

The local branch of the P. E. I. T. F. met in convention in New Haven School on Aug. 27, with the president, Mr. McFadyen, in the chair. Miss Emily Platts, was elected secretary for the meeting. There were twenty-three teachers, and several visitors present. The president, then proceeded to appoint the following committees:—

Resolution Committee, Miss G. Ackland, Messrs M. MacKenzie, and J. Flood.

Nomination Committee, Miss Smallwood, Miss Murray, Miss Frisbie.

Question Box Committee, Miss MacCannell and Mr. M. Tierney.

Press Committee, Miss G. Ackland and Mr. C. MacLean.

The president then gave a short address in which he outlined some of the problems confronting the convention especially that of changing the place of the meetings.

The inspector Mr. Edward MacPhail, was then called upon for some remarks. Mr. MacPhail first outlined the duties of the various committees that had been appointed, and then explained the object of holding these local conventions. He then went on and gave some very interesting and helpful hints to the teachers, regarding the conducting of the classes, dismissal of the pupils and many other difficulties which confront a teacher.

After the remarks by the inspector, a paper was read by Mr. MacKenzie. In his paper Mr. MacKenzie dealt with the system of education of P. E. I. as compared with that of the other provinces. Mr. MacKenzie, showed by his papers that he had given much thought to this subject, and the paper was very interesting in the way in which it dealt with the various difficulties which confront a teacher.

The question box was opened and a general discussion took place on the numerous questions asked. A great many viewpoints on different matters of great interest to the teaching profession, were exchanged and many difficulties solved.

The meeting then adjourned until the afternoon.

At this point in the day's program a dinner lunch was served by the lady teachers.

In the afternoon session Miss Rose MacDougal, read the minutes of the last meeting, which were adopted.

Miss E. Platts, then read the minutes of the previous session.

Miss Mona Wilson, Chief Red Cross Nurse, followed with a delightful address. Miss Wilson, dealt with the various ways in which a teacher can help the Red Cross and the Red Cross can help the teacher. She also gave the teachers an idea of the work that was being accomplished by the Red Cross and appealed for the co-operation of the teachers in soliciting funds for the Red Cross work. The speaker also adapted the organizing of Junior Red Cross, and showed how this organization extends service in different ways.

The Chief Superintendent of Education, Mr. Shaw, then addressed the teachers, Mr. Shaw dealt extensively with the matter of text books and the course of studies. He heartily endorsed the remarks by Miss Wilson, and expressed himself as being of the opinion that the practical manner of teaching, which is being done by the Junior Red Cross is the best way for the lower grades. Mr. Shaw answered a great many questions that were asked by the teachers. He also dealt with numerous matters of importance to teachers, such as the marking of portfolios, the beautification of the school grounds, the payment of teachers salaries, and the importance of physical training.

The reports of the various committees were then heard. The following resolutions were drawn up and adopted.

- Resolved that the local branch of the P. E. I. T. F. which has formerly met at New Haven, should in the future meet in Charlottetown.
- Resolved that the suggestion, regarding the work of the Red Cross, as proposed by Miss Wilson, be carried out as far as possible by the teachers.
- Resolved that study groups be organized at suitable centres in such a way that every teacher desiring to do so might enter into a group.
- Resolved that a vote of thanks be extended to the ladies for the excellent lunch provided.

POPULAR SHIPYARD OFFICIAL DIED IN MONTREAL HOSPITAL

F. W. Hindley Passes Away While in Montreal on Business for Firm—Widely Known in City

The death occurred in the Royal Victoria hospital, Montreal, of Fred W. Hindley, Mr. Hindley had gone to Montreal in company with D. J. K. Scouler, superintendent of the Halifax shipyards, to examine some proposed construction before submitting a tender on behalf of the local shipyard. While there the deceased was taken ill and had a hemorrhage of the lungs. Little hope was held for his recovery and he finally succumbed at 4.30 Thursday afternoon, August 23.

Mr. Hindley was born in England in 1886 and came to Toronto as a young man to enter a shipbuilding firm there. In 1920 he entered the employ of the shipyards and at the time of his death was master mechanic. He leaves a wife to mourn his loss. Burial took place Saturday afternoon at Campbellton

First Story Over Submarine Cable

Aboard Cable Steamer "Dominia", August 27. — Five hundred miles out from Bay Roberts, N. F., more than eight hundred miles of cable still to lay before reaching the Azores, the Dominia today reached the deepest part of the Atlantic on the route selected for the world's fastest duplex ocean cable. For one hundred miles of the route the sea floor is 2,500 fathoms below the keel of the ship — nearly three miles. Once this deep valley is passed, however, the chart shows a gradual rise to 2,000 fathoms, then to 1,000 fathoms, and as the Azores are reached, a precipitous rise to the ocean mountain peak which is Fayal, the cable relay point of the Azores group.

Since leaving Bay Roberts, on August 23, the Dominia has been making an average speed of seven and one half knots. Mile after mile the cable rolls overboard as the ship is kept on the exact course charted by the Dominia on her Westbound trip before beginning the cable laying task. As deep water is reached, the strain on the cable registers an increase on the dynamometer, and the brakes on the great paying-out drums are eased off to pay out cable faster. Thus allowance is made for changes in the contour of the sea floor, for the cable must lie safely cushioned in the soft ooze of the bottom. Should it become suspended between two subterranean peaks, it would in time chafe through the insulation, and communication would be interrupted.

Engineers of the Western Union Telegraph Company aboard the Dominia state that the schedule fixed by the Dominia is being adhered to with almost clock-like exactness. If the present rate of speed is continued without interruption, the Dominia will land the shore end of the cable at Horta on Sept. 3rd, and communication will be established with Bay Roberts immediately by Western Union engineers and cable experts.

The Dominia, a British steamer owned by the Telegraph Maintenance and Construction Company, is laying the cable for the Western Union Telegraph Company under contract. This contract has definite time limits — hence the meticulousness with which the schedule is being followed.


