WOMEN'S "ESCAPE" FOR OVER FIFTY

NEW YORK, May 22 — (CP) — Thousands of solitary women in Manhattan who have to live in small furnished rooms for economic reasons, are finding the "L" Club an "escape" from their own four lonely walls. The "L" Club, founded by Mrs. Walter Sedgwick, is a workshop and a social meeting place for women over fifty who live alone in furnished rooms. There are facilities to do an odd job of sewing, laundry equipment and cooking utensils — "things that don't go with a \$3 a week room." Nobody asks prying questions when you join the club. There are no dues—no red tape. Mrs. Sedgwick said the club was born of the realization "women who have gone through the harrowing humiliation of relief haven't very pleasant thoughts for company as they sit alone in their furnished rooms." At the "L" Club headquarters for 50—"the Roman friendly and learn to smile again, there a piano, too, and sometimes flowers.

U. S. LOOKS INTO PILOT FAILURE

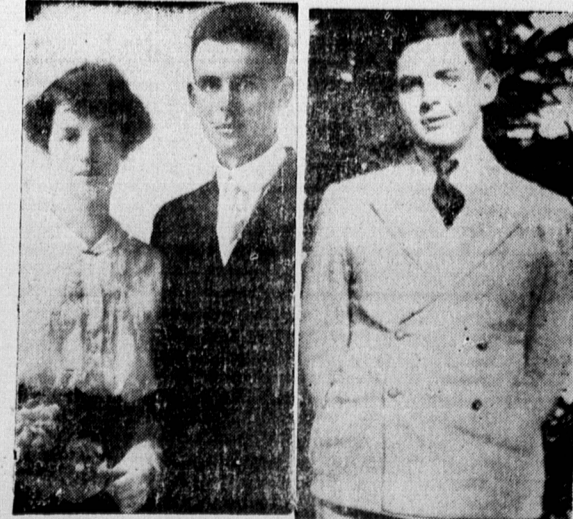

London District Farmer Kills Self and Family



Twelve-year-old June Hunt was shot through the head by her father, William Hunt, of Scotsville, who snuffed out the lives of his family with a game rifle and took his own life.
