P. E. I. DAIRY ASSOCIATION

(Continued.)

(Inspector Morrow's report concluded)

Tyne Valley—Four visits. Not much improvement noticeable a portion of the milk being delivered in an over-ripe condition and the curing room is not first class.

Vernon River—Made six visits to this factory and not much improvement noticeable, the tanks and spouts not being well kept.

Whitshire—Four visits made. Improvement noted, but factory requires new floor and whey drain.

Winstoe—Visited factory five times, and general improvement noted.

It will be noticed that an improvement has been shown in the majority of cases but we have to report in too many instances that the milk supply is not up to the standard.

In many cases it has been delivered in an over-ripe condition, this latter defect being due to the fact that the milk had not been sufficiently cooled, which is certainly an important point, providing the necessary cleanliness has been exercised.

If this most important point the cooling of the milk is properly attended to, the latter is less liable to develop the numerous flavors caused by feed and water of an impure nature as well as germ life, and I will go so far as to say that if all our milk for cheese making were cooled to 60 degrees Fahrenheit and even less in supplying to a creamery, seven eighths of the trouble we have to contend with in our work would be overcome.

As it is Monday's make of cheese or butter is not suitable to be classed as "fresh" in very many cases.

In very many cases also the milks cans in use should be discarded being rusty and broken and making it impossible to keep them in a cleanly condition.

Even when these cans receive the best treatment, they are not fit for use. As regards the whey tanks and drains, a number of cases must receive attention in the future. This will be necessary for at you know, most of our tanks are built of wood which is not nearly as suitable as iron, or something of that nature which could be easily cleaned or scalded out.

If we do not adopt some such whey tanks as this we will have what some of our upper province buyers call "whey tank" flavor. In a number of factories, also, the drainage requires more attention. The floors in some need to be tightened and in some cases new floors altogether are needed.

Where such is possible I would recommend cement floors these being more durable and the cheapest in the end.

A program of the conference of Dairy Experts of the Dominion at Ottawa which Mr. Morrow attended, was also submitted.

Thereport was discussed at some length and valuable suggestions made by a number of the speakers on the milk supply etc. The following directors were appointed:—

King's Co.—Lauchlin McDonald, Lakeville; J. C. Underhay, Bay Fortune; Queen's Co.—Arthur Simpson, Bay View; Jas. Monaghan, Hazelbrook; J. R. Edwards, North Whitshire.

Prince Co.—John Anderson, Kensington; Hubert McDonald, Summerside.

Auditor—A. E. Dewar, Charlottetown.

A sum of no exceeding \$800 was voted for the necessary funds of the Association for the coming year.

The following resolutions were passed: Moved by Rev. A. E. Burke, seconded by R. Jenkins that the executive regulate the annual meeting that it may be held at some distinctly stated time, in Charlottetown.

Moved by John Underhay, seconded by John Ferguson, that in view of the faulty Island cheese on the English market, the Dairy Department take steps for proper transportation to be maintained from factory to market.

Moved by Alfred Small, seconded by Jas. M. McLeod, that the Association reiterate the resolution calling for legislation to secure the inspection of dairy butter in the Island in the interests of dairying.

A resolution was passed thanking Superintendent Sharp for his kindness to the delegates.

Votes of condolence were also passed to Mrs. James E. McDonald on the death of her husband, and to Inspector Morrow on the death of his wife.

Moved by Rev. J. A. McDonald, seconded by John Anderson, that the thanks of the Association be tendered to the Department of Agriculture for the valuable services of Prof. Zafelt during the past season.

In discussing the Dairy School Mr. Morrow advised the holding of the school in May. The question as to the procuring of a good instructor was also considered.

A. E. Dewar advised experimental stations for dairying as for fruit growing. John T. Ferguson endorsed this suggestion.

A. E. Dewar, John Anderson and others discussed the best way of increasing the milk supply and suggested the offering of prizes.

J. R. Edwards thought the farmers should be given more confidence in the work by showing the success of others.

Secretary of Agriculture McMillan urged the better care of cattle, especially in winter and the improvement of the herds.

A letter was read from R. E. Spillett urging that cheese for export be made uniform in size. He advised taller cheese for English market ranging 75 to 80 lbs. in weight as compared with 55 to 74 lbs. as at present. Speaking of the cheese quality he also enclosed a clipping from the Daily Guardian giving the opinion of R. M. Ballantyne, a leading dairy authority on the excellence of our Island cheese.

The increase of milk supply was further discussed by Prof. McMillan, Father Burke, J. R. Edwards and others, after which the session of the Association came to a close.

READING THE WAR NEWS.

It is a fine art to be able to read the war news with intelligence, when your paper is filled with conflicting dispatches from different points and rumors of the work of official reports. Possibly a few hints may help some bewildered people. Observe the place from which the dispatch comes. If it should be reported from Halifax, for example, that the Russians had captured Tokio, you should be justified in thinking that some one was yarning, for why should Halifax have such important news before London, St. Petersburg or Vladivostok? A little knowledge

of geography and cable communication will help one a lot in sifting the wheat of the news from the chaff. As things are now, a dispatch from Shanghai concerning events in Japan should be regarded as fairly authentic, because the only line of cable communication now remaining with Japan runs down to Shanghai; but all dispatches over this wire are censored.

Anything official concerning Alexieff may also be depended upon, so far as it goes. If the admiral says the torpedoed battleships have been floated, he can be believed; but if he should say that the Russian would be ready for action again by Sunday he would probably be trying to bluff the enemy. And her hint of this: If news is apparently important, yet not quite credible on the face of it should come almost simultaneously from different points, the mere fact that it emanated from different places, rather than one would strengthen its inherent probability.

But even a multiplicity of reports from different quarters would not establish a fact, if the known conditions were such as to render it absurd. If Cheloo, Shanghai and Hong Kong should say tomorrow morning that, according to rumor, Vladivostok had surrendered to the Japanese without firing a shot, after surprised by Japanese marines, who had skated in on the ice, you would be justified in accepting the news with caution.

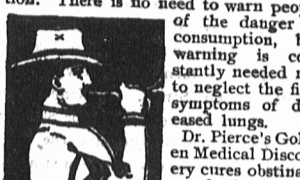
