**An Increase in the Canadian Fisheries.**

OTTAWA, July 15.—Canadian fisheries for the fiscal year which closed with March last produced a total commercial revenue in excess of sixty million dollars, or an increase of \$25,000,000 as compared with the fiscal year which closed with March, 1917. The export trade in fish for the last fiscal year was worth \$40,637,172, an increase of more than one hundred per cent. in value as compared with 1914.

The increase over preceding year was in excess of four million dollars.

The export trade with the United Kingdom increased from \$6,726,389 in 1914 to \$9,916,979 in the year while the trade with the United States jumped from \$5,644,353 in 1914 to \$17,180,250 last year. The great increase in fish sales to the United States has been due to the fact that the value of canned salmon sold to the republic in 1914 was \$115,360, while last year it was \$12,067,319. During the span of six years there has been a jump of nearly three hundred per cent. in the value of dry salted cod, ling hake and pollock shipped into the United States.

**SPRAY CALENDAR FOR POTATOES**

When the plants are six inches high, spray with poisoned Bordeaux and repeat every ten days or two weeks until the tops die of old age or frost.

For the first spray use poisoned 4-4-40 Bordeaux and for the second and later sprays, poisoned 6-6-40 Bordeaux.

To make 4-4-40 Bordeaux, dissolve 4 lbs. of bluestone in 4 gallons of water, hang a sack of bluestone in a coarse sack at the top of the water, 24 hours before using. Dilute the four gallons of bluestone stock solution up to twenty gallons. In another container slack four pounds of stone lime or wet up four pounds of hydrated lime; dilute this up to twenty gallons.

Either put the lime solution into the spray tank first or pour the two solutions in together or pour them in by alternate buckets. Strain all solutions going into a potato sprayer. If arsenate of lime lead arsenate or Paris green are to be added, add them last. For a 6-6-40 Bordeaux, use six lbs. of bluestone and 6 of lime.

In 40 gallons of Bordeaux use any one of the following poisons: Arsenate of lime, 1 1/2 lbs. to 40 gallons. Arsenate of lead, dry, 2 lbs. to 40 gallons. Paris green, 1 lb. to 40 gallons. Arsenate of zinc, 1 1/4 lbs. to 40 gallons.

Arsenate of soda (arsenolite or solarate) may be used at the rate of 1 lb. to 40 gallons, this poison must be combined with Bordeaux. Directions for using white arsenic may be obtained from the writer.

Use from 60 to 80 gallons per acre per application. Where a man applies only 30 to 40 gallons per acre, he cannot expect to control insects and diseases with the above formulas. Some double,

**RELIGIOUS ISSUE IS NOT INVOLVED.**

In Recent Troubles in the I.O.D.E.

OTTAWA, July 15.—The statement made by Mr. T. R. Ferguson, K. C. of Toronto, at the celebration of the anniversary of the B. I. of the Boyne yesterday, at Toronto, to the effect that he believed an effort was being made by the Catholics to obtain control of the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire, is resented by prominent members of the local branch of the order. Mr. Ferguson said that the scheme had led to the recent trouble between Lady Kingsmill and Mrs. A. E. Gooderham, the former president of the national executive, and had resulted in many Toronto ladies, prominent in the order for years, being forced out.

Lady Pope regent of the Municipal Chapter, I.O.D.E., had the following to say about Mr. Ferguson's charge:

"Mr. T. R. Ferguson, K. C. of Toronto, in making the extraordinary statement that the Roman Catholics were making an effort to control the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire, has said something which he would find extremely difficult to prove. It would be very interesting to the Daughters to know on what grounds he bases so serious an assertion. The difficulties between Lady Kingsmill and Mrs. A. E. Gooderham were purely on points connected with the administration of the order, with which the question of religion was never even remotely connected. Besides, both ladies are of the Protestant faith."

Lady Pope, who has been a member of that order for over 17 years, stated that she had never heard the subject of religion mentioned, in connection with the order. In fact, if any member brought the subject up at any meeting she would be quickly called to order.

"The Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire is solely a patriotic organization, open to all Canadians of all races and creeds," she said. The very large majority of the order is of the Protestant faith.

**REV. W. D. WILSON OFFERED NEW POSITION.**

FREDERICTON, July 14.—Rev. W. D. Wilson will probably become general secretary of the Social Service Council of Quebec and New Brunswick within a short time unless some new arrangements are made for him to continue his present duties.

While Mr. Wilson declares that he has not fully considered the offer as yet, it is understood to have been of a most enticing character, and, moreover, it is looked upon as a promotion. The offer came to him last month, when the prohibition campaign was at its height, and he says he replied to those who made the offer, stating he was then too busily engaged in the campaign to consider the matter, but would let them know later.

This morning Mr. Wilson said he had the matter under consideration, but it had not as yet been placed before the N. B. Temperance Alliance. He declined to further discuss the matter, except to say that he had as yet made no decision.


