DOING SPLENDID WORK—The Souris Red Cross Society is still busy. Last week they started a 10-cent campaign on a house to house canvass for 10 cent contributions and in this way collected \$28.65. The centre piece donated by Mrs. Courroy was disposed of by lottery, at the same time for \$6.30, making a total of \$35.00 to be spent in yarn and flanellette. This society is also giving \$9.00 a month for the support of two island fishermen. Last fall \$75.00 was donated to the Sailors' Relief Fund; \$10.00 to Miss Plummer for the Soldiers' Christmas Fund. Besides, during the winter, pyjamas, etc. were sent to Headquarters and before the men of the King's County Draft left Souris, each received a pair of socks from the society. At Christmas, socks were bought with the society funds, and also much material needed to fill up the boxes of comforts sent to the Souris boys in the trenches.—&
