PROGRESS IN PUBLIC HEALTH IN CH'TOWN

Interesting Addresses At Women's Institute Convention.

Following is a summary of an interesting address on the progress of health measures in Charlottetown, delivered at the annual convention of Women's Institutes in Prince of Wales College hall on Thursday evening by Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, M. L. A., City Health Officer. The Doctor thanked the convention for bestowing on him the honour to say a few words, and then said: "I don't know what to talk about, but as I have a great interest in medicine, and I know the Institutes look after the health of our children, and since this question is ever before it I will dwell a short time on the advances made for the promotion of health."

"I have been in Charlottetown now 20 years, and one of the first questions that came up was advisability of school examination and inspection. It is not necessary to tell the Women's Institutes to safeguard health. Their work is a splendid record. I always advocated that the school should be as clean as the home."

"Our next step was the institution of the Red Cross, which started after the war. It had a great deal of money but after it was running a while, funds began to get low. The Government was asked for a loan but could not give anything until I had the honour of becoming a member and impressed upon my colleagues the need of a grant. A grant of \$2,500 was secured, later raised to \$3,500, the other thousand for fighting tuberculosis."

"Prince Edward Island is the richest province in Canada per capita and every other province is far ahead of us in public health. In Charlottetown we tried to have every child vaccinated in order to prevent smallpox and diphtheria, and at last ordered that every child must be vaccinated before he can enter school. Now through the Red Cross drive about 80 per cent. of the children in town are vaccinated, and practically 100 per cent. of the school children. There are a great number of cripples here, but there are many that can be cured. A number of times a year a specialist comes and treats all cripples which are brought to him. The defect, if not cured, is so much lessened as to be very little inconvenience. Great strides are being made in dealing with infantile paralysis."

Dr. MacMillan gave great praise to the Institutes for their helping so greatly the procuring of the Sanatorium and for their great drive for funds, resulting in \$77,000 to supplement the grant of the government. In conclusion the Doctor told of Dr. Woodhouse's generous offer to give an equal amount of money to that which the government expended for health. He gave great praise to the benefit done to young children by the Children's Aid Society. A hearty vote of thanks to Dr. MacMillan was moved and seconded.

Evening Session.

At the evening session several enjoyable numbers were interspersed between the addresses. They included a violin solo by Prof. Oscar Emanuel; Reading, Miss Austina Mutch; vocal solo, Miss Doris Tait, and a reading by Miss Ruby Rehnberg of Waltham, Mass.

His Worship Mayor T. W. L. Prowse said it was a great pleasure to extend a welcome to Charlottetown. They were always glad to have conventions here. What impressed him most in the work of the Institutes was the assistance they gave to the Hospital. We in Charlottetown said, are very proud of our city. We have done everything possible to beautify our streets, squares and lawns. In conclusion he again extended a most hearty welcome to the ladies of the Institutes.

Miss Helen MacDougall, Superintendent of Women's Institutes, Nova Scotia, said she had been watching their growth and was going to tell them something of the work in Nova Scotia. In her opening remarks the speaker referred to the interesting work of the Institute. It is really an institution that serves the people,

Wheat Crops Will Be Below Average

ROME, July 12—The Canadian wheat crop this year will be below average in volume, the Institute of Agriculture said in a communique today. The report said Canada had 24,583,000 acres of wheat this year, a decrease of 672,000 acres compared with 1929. The crop itself was in better condition July 1, the report said, than at the same period a year ago, but the volume will be below average. Favorable conditions were reported in Manitoba and Northern and Eastern Saskatchewan as well as in Northern Alberta.

("Provided that, if any country imposes upon oats produced in and imported from Canada rates of duty higher than are enumerated in this item, equivalent rates of duty shall be imposed upon oats entering Canada from that country.")

Potatoes	British prefer.	Free

("Provided that, if any country imposes on potatoes grown or processed in and imported from Canada, an equal duty shall be imposed on potatoes coming into Canada from such country.")

Mr. Dunning's explanation of this clause is as follows: "It has been decided, however, to embody within the wording of a limited number of items of this class provision for a 'countervailing duty,' whereby Canada, while not generally raising its scheduled rates, imposes upon such products from another country rates equivalent to those imposed by that country upon the identical Canadian product, WHERE THESE ARE HIGHER THAN THE RATES ENUMERATED IN THE CANADIAN TARIFF SCHEDULE. This means that other countries that both buy and sell to us these commodities, HAVE IT IN THEIR OWN POWER, BY RECIPROCAL ACTION ON THEIR PART, TO ENABLE US TO REDUCE DUTIES TO THE LEVEL OF THE RATES STATED IN OUR TARIFF."

These are the words of Mr. Dunning himself to be found on page 1711 of Hansard of May 1.

THE LEVEL OF RATES ON POTATOES (stated in the Dunning Tariff, item 83, page 1715 of Hansard), IS FREE.
