When he had urged enlarged sugar production in Canada years ago he had been met with only "good-natured tolerance" from the Liberals.

Such adjustments need not cause inflation as it could be avoided by the use of existing machinery to provide price fixing, bonuses, subsidies and rationing.

Primary producers must have additions to existing prices to bring them within reach of a decent standard of living.

Mr. Blackmore said the Government should make an inventory of all surplus goods, including wheat and other primary products, and create to distribute these goods credit instruments in the form of stamps, coupons, dollar bills or bonds.

These credit instruments would be debt free and could be used for subsidies, loans, bonuses and guarantees to producers and for the care of the aged, sick and other needy.

Mark Senn (Prog. Con. Halton) said it was "most disappointing" that the throne speech made no reference to any measures to remedy the shortage of farm products.

Farm production was as important to the war effort as any other production, said Mr. Senn, but farmers were working under handicaps which must be removed if maximum food production were to be reached.

Mr. Senn said he was receiving a relatively small share of the national income and too many of them failed to receive enough return to pay the costs of production.
