OBITUARY.—Another home has been made desolate; another little spirit has gone to the bright home where there is neither sickness nor dying, neither sorrow nor parting, and where all tears shall be wiped away. On Saturday May 20th, death visited the home of Jesse W. and Mrs. Leard, Craupaud taking away their infant son George Camden, aged four months. The funeral which took place on Sunday, the 21st last was conducted by the Rev. T. Stebbings. The service was a very impressive one. The sympathy of the community is extended to Mr. and Mrs. Leard in their bereavement.

ALL that was mortal of the late Mary Irene Horne, daughter of John and Mrs. Horne, Winsloe, was laid to rest in Sherwood cemetery, Sunday afternoon. The funeral was one of the largest ever seen in that part of the country. The deceased who was in her 15th year will be greatly missed in the home, day school and Sunday school in all of which she was greatly admired on account of her sweet disposition and beautiful character. Rev. F. Frizzle officiated, the services being most impressive, leading all hearts upward to the "brighter world" to which our dear friend led the way. The pall bearers were Benj. Rodd, Ham Rodd, Jack Jenkins, and Joseph Holroyd.

THE C. P. R. crop report which was issued at Winnipeg several days ago could be summarized in one word—excellent. There is not a point on the whole of the C. P. R. through the wheat raising country from which complaint is made, and as for weather conditions the only variation noted from the word "favorable" is the phrase "very favorable." Rapidly growing wheat varies from two to six inches in height and forms a thick mat on all of the fields where seeding was well and carefully done. There have been several showers in some localities, but they have been appreciated and by no means excessive. Even the districts in which the sub-soil is gravel and sand and which usually are the first to complain of dry weather the people are extremely confident. Farmers and country merchants are enthusiastic, for the grain is now at a stage where it will take extremely bad weather to do serious damage. With a reasonable amount of rain fall, during June and July, the amount of wheat grown will create a new record.

THE Board of Trustees of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Methodist Conference met in the schoolroom of Centenary church on Wednesday afternoon. Rev. Thomas Marshall occupied the chair. The meeting was chiefly concerned with routine business. A pleasant feature of the proceedings, however, was the passing of a resolution concerning Rev. George W. Fisher. For some years Mr. Fisher has done splendid duty on the board, but having been transferred to the Montreal Conference, it was necessary this year for him to resign his position as secretary-treasurer of the board. This he did at Wednesday's meeting, and the resolution referred to, which was moved by Mr. W. D. Baskin, spoke in very complimentary terms of Mr. Fisher's painstaking work while he has been connected with this branch of the church work. Several members of the board spoke on the resolution, expressing deep regret at Mr. Fisher's departure from this conference. Mr. Fisher, who has been stationed at Milltown during the past year, will take the pastorate of a church in the Montreal Conference in a few weeks.—St. John Globe.

Stewart, 30th; New Perth, Webster's Corner, July 3rd; Millview, Marshfield, 4th; Cornwall, Miscouche, 5th; Long Creek, Egmont Bay, 6th; Hampton Freeland, 7th; Tryon, Springfield, 8th; Upper Freetown, St. Anthony's 10th; Kensington, Alberton, 11th; Clinton, Tignish, 12th; Mayfield, 13th; Bradalbane, 14th. The work for Duncan Anderson and W. F. Stephen is in two divisions and for the local lecturers in four divisions.

THIS death occurred at Gibson N.B. Friday morning of James A. Ruel C. E., one of the best known residents of York County. He was taken ill while employed on the St. John water extension a few weeks ago and was obliged to return home. Bright's disease was the cause of death. The deceased was a native of this city, his father being the late James R. Ruel, at one time clerk of the customs. He was twice married, his first wife being a daughter of Edgar Hanson of this city, and the second, who with one son and three daughters survives, was Miss McLaughlin of St. John West. Deceased was widely known as a civil engineer and deputy crown land surveyor and played a prominent part in railway construction throughout the province. He surveyed the line of the New Brunswick Railway from Gibson to Edmundston, and also the line of the Canada Eastern, and afterwards built part of that road under contract. He also surveyed the Stanley branch railway, and during the past few years has had to do with railway work on Prince Edward Island for the dominion government. He was a member of the militia company sent from Fredericton to St. Andrews in 1866, and held a Fenian Raid medal. Two brothers, John and Charles, reside in the west, and Mrs. Dibble, wife of the police magistrate of Woodstock, is a sister. A son of the deceased is employed in the Royal Bank, and a daughter, Frances H., graduated from the University of N.B. last week.—St. John Sun.

PHOTO STANDARD.—The Government steamer Petrel arrived here on Monday last in command of Capt. Kent, who has had her refitted throughout with all the latest improvements. It seems almost impossible that such a small craft can be made so comfortable and roomy. Every alteration gained room and comfort. The engineers' and officers' quarters and mess room are fitted with every modern convenience. The pantry is fitted in a style that would compare favorably with any the modern ocean liner can produce. Hot and cold water, steam heaters, and the finest equipment of china on any craft of her kind. The master's dining room, which is immediately aft of the officers' quarters, and the pantry, reminds one of a miniature palace. It is only 12x22 feet and on each side is a beautiful plush settee of the finest red silk plush. The room is also beautifully carpeted, which with the beautifully enamelled walls, makes as neat and pretty a dining room as one would wish to see. Just aft of this room is the master's sleeping apartments, which are fitted on a par with every other part of the vessel. On the main deck is the chart room, in which are all the necessary charts and other equipment, and flags for the International code signals. The Petrel is to take the place of the famed old Kingfisher and is a 12 knot boat. Her dimensions are, length, (over all) 126 feet; beam, 22ft. 6 in; draft, 9 ft., and is 400 h. p. She will carry 22 men and will be armed with the Ross rifles and the Nordenfeldt quick-firing guns. Her officers are:—
