MAY GET TWO NEW BUSES — Premier J. Walter Jones was advised yesterday by the Transit Controller that every effort was being made to get two more buses to the Island Motor Transport to assist in solving the transportation problem here. It is expected that the first of these will be available shortly. At present the Island Motor Transport only has six coaches, which is insufficient to handle essential business.

THOMAS WILMOT MORRISON One of the best known and most highly respected citizens of Flat River, in the person of Thomas Wilmot Morrison, passed away on Saturday, June 3, 1944, after an illness of three weeks. Mr. Morrison was born June 18, 1864, in the house in which he lived all his life. He was the son of Charles L. and Maria Sell Morrison. During his last illness he was tenderly cared for by his daughters. He was predeceased by his wife two years ago. Mr. Morrison, who was widely known throughout the Province, was a man of broad sympathy and understanding. He endeared himself to all by his friendly spirit and readiness to help in time of need. Friends and neighbours always found him ready with practical assistance and wise counsel. He was keenly interested in the political, social and religious activities of the Island. An esteemed Elder in St. John's Presbyterian Church, Flat River, he was always present at church service when circumstances permitted and was a faithful servant of the Christ he served. The funeral service, which was largely attended, was held from his late residence and was conducted by his Pastor, Rev. E. C. Evans, who spoke in fitting terms of his life and character from the words "I have fought a good fight, I have kept the faith." OUTLINE OF PRINCIPALS REPORT

In his report the principal outlined the progress of the school during the year and said that the classes had taken part in many extra curricular activities as well as the regular work. He also reported that Murray Harbour School (south) had secured one of the Lord Strathcona prizes for physical training. The principal presented very forcefully to the assembled parents the necessity of having a greater interest in school affairs. He criticized the people for allowing the school to become dirty and out of repair also for keeping children of school age out of school to work in the factories.
