## Cincinnati Recapture First Place By Twin Victory Over Terrymen

## Galento Is Rated No. 1 Challenger

## Field Of 82 Will Tee Off

NEW YORK, June 23—(AP)—Cincinnati Reds played like champions today to defeat New York Giants twice 7-4 and 2-0. By this twin victory the Reds recaptured first place in the National Baseball League.

Gene Thompson blanked the Giants with three hits in the nightcap, while the Reds made the most of their opportunities against Paul Dean.

A five-run rally in the ninth settled the first game blasting Carl Hubbell from the box.

Billy Jurges, Giant shortstop, was felled by a ball thrown by pitcher Bucky Walters and suffered a concussion. It was announced x-rays showed no evidence of any fracture.

The Dodgers and Pittsburgh Pirates battled 13 innings to a 4-4 tie at Brooklyn before the second game of their doubleheader was called on account of darkness. The Pirates won the first game 8-5 by jumping on three Dodger pitchers for 16 hits.

The Cubs pounded out four consecutive doubles in their big inning.

St. Louis Cardinals routed the Bees 9-2 in Boston.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 23—(AP)—Sep Pain drove the veteran Greyhound, world's champion trotter, to victory Saturday in straight heats in the feature event of the Grand Circuit's opening summer harness race program at the state fairgrounds.

The eight-year-old gelding, competing in its first regular race since 1938, won the Trotting Horse Club of America (first division) stake race with dashes of 2:02 3/4 and 2:03 1/4. The stake was valued at \$2346.

JONANNEBURG, June 23—(CP)—The South African National Boxing Association has been asked for rulings following protracted public discussion on the appearance of amateur and professional boxers on the same program at army and other service force boxing tournaments throughout the Union.

Army sports organizations in South Africa are hoping for some relaxation of the rigid rules regarding professional and amateur boxers.

In South African boxing, where the division between amateurs and professionals is very sharp, amateur status is jealously guarded and once a boxer has entered the professional ranks he cannot return to his amateur status.

In England, war has broken down many of the barriers between amateur and professional sport, and there are many who feel South Africa should follow suit.

## Buck Newsom Chalks Up Ninth Straight Win As Bengals Defeat Yanks

NEW YORK, June 23—(AP)—Louie (Buck) Newsom chalked up his ninth consecutive pitching victory and the Tigers crept to within a game-and-a-half of leading Cleveland Indians by routing Yankees 9-2 today at Detroit in the deciding contest of a three-game American Baseball League series.

Newsom allowed only four hits. The Tigers banged out 15 hits off Marvin Bruer and Steve Sundra. The blows included a homer, three bagger and single by Rudy York.

Jim Tabor placed Boston Red Sox back in the victory column, his two homers defeating the Indians 2-0 in the nightcap of a doubleheader at Cleveland, after league-leading Indians took the opener 4-1.

Boston ended a seven-game losing streak, but it was forced to do so without the services of outfielder Ted Williams, injured by a collision with Roger Cramer in the first contest.

The Browns salvaged one game of their four-game series with Washington, defeating the Senators 3-2 in the nightcap of a doubleheader at St. Louis, called on account of darkness after seven innings. Washington won the first game 12-5.

Cleveland Indians and Detroit Tigers combined to drop the Boston Red Sox into third place Saturday.

The Indians scored their seventh victory in a row and handed Boston their sixth successive loss 7-5 at Cleveland.

The Tigers downed New York Yankees 3-2 at Detroit.

Washington edged out St. Louis 11-10 in a free-hitting game while Philadelphia and Chicago were rained out.

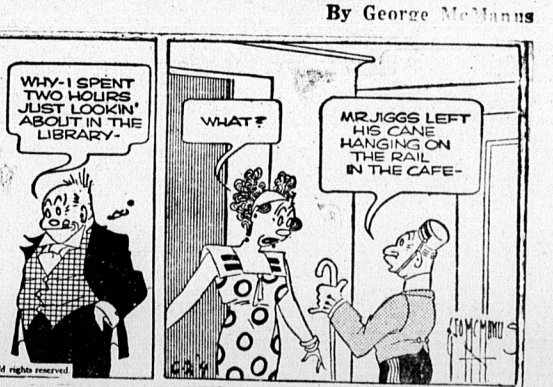
