THE CITY LIGHTING.

The action of the City Council in regard to the street lighting evinces an apparent determination on the part of the Mayor and majority of the Councilors to continue the present contractor in the work, regardless of the notoriously inefficient service, regardless of price, of public opinion or of business honesty. Competition by tender has been reduced to a farce.

Last year the Council called for tenders for various terms of one, three or five years. The Full Company tendered at \$50 and the Royal, or Montreal Company at \$60 per lamp. Then the scheme was devised of rejecting the lower tender and continuing the old contract while an appeal was made to the people on the question of City ownership. The plebiscite decided against City ownership and again tenders were called for. This time the tender of the Full Company was \$60.50 and that of the Royal Company was \$95 per lamp. Now a new pretext is sought for refusing the lower tender—a tender \$25.50 lower than that of the Royal Company.

The reason for this shuffle need not be inquired into. It is only too apparent. Further a pathy on the part of the press and public in face of what has been revealed would seem to be impossible. The course pursued by the majority of the Council cannot be actuated by motives of honesty and fair-dealing. Hang it in any light you like and it cannot bear the appearance of justice or fair play. We have a letter on the subject which space will not permit of publishing to-day. It will appear to-morrow.

The closing exercises at St. Dunstan's College yesterday were of engaging interest and creditable to all connected with the institution. A number of prominent public men, including His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, Premier Farquharson, Dr. Anderson, Dr. Taylor and Judge Warburton spoke in warm commendation of the College, its faculty and its work. Rev. Dr. Morrison's address to the students was excellent as it was unique. The valedictory pronounced by Mr. J. J. McGowan was a production showing much thought, clothed in graceful diction and enriched with literary references which show extensive reading. We bespeak for him and the other bright young graduates a future that will reflect honor upon their Alma Mater.

It is in the public interest that all public entertainments shall be free from the taint of immorality. Unfortunately there are too many performances of itinerant companies which run painfully close to the border line where propriety ceases. One of these travelling companies still touring in the Maritime Provinces, we believe, has called forth from the St. John Sun of recent date the following pointed criticism:

"When Rose Syddell's London Belles played here before, their performance, while hardly of a drawing-room variety, contained nothing deserving of police suppression, and they traded upon this reputation last night to present a show so frankly indecent that one needed a moral insensibility that few men in cold blood would readily admit, to sit the production through. And yet the most of the audience did and applauded hilariously throughout, though a few had the courage to leave, in spite of the guying that such action received from the stage."
