THE anticipated advance in the price of sugar has been made. Following the three increases recently ordered by the refiners, the jobbing price in St. John was yesterday advanced ten cents per hundred pounds. This goes into effect at once. The quotations now for standard granulated are \$4.85 cash per 100 pounds by the barrel. This increase will affect the retail price to a certain extent. Perhaps sugar will not be advanced a cent a pound, but a smaller quantity will be sold for a dollar. The sugar market at present is strong and prospects are for still further advances.—St. John Sun, No. 2.

THE action—McKinnon vs. the McLaughlin Carriage Company is down for trial in the city on November 22. The case will be tried on three counts—a suit, false imprisonment and malicious prosecution. On the last named the question has been raised by the defendant company that they are not liable on a discharge of habeas corpus, which was granted on an order of the Chief Justice. This point was settled by the court at Fredericton next week. At the trial here, L. A. Curry, K. C., will represent the plaintiff and G. T. G. Teed, of Hamilton Teed & Haining has been briefed for the defendants.—St. John Telegraph.
