**Stevenage Protests Planning Proposals**

STEVENAGE, England, Nov. 3.—(CP)—Chief objection to the proposed new town site, under the New Towns Act of 1946, is that it would blot out the town's rural individuality.

At a public inquiry before Arnold Morris, planning inspector of the Ministry of Town and Country Planning, local residents and landowners, with representatives of the National Farmers' Union and the Metropolitan Water Board voiced their objections to the planned extension of Stevenage by the ministry.

Cope Morgan, K.C., for the Residents' Protection Association, said the scheme would "ruin the integration of Stevenage and stamp out its individuality."

"The result," he said, "would be a sprawl and the unique feature about it is that it would be a planned sprawl."

Lord Lytton, whose estate, Knebworth Park, lies near, said he spoke as a "lifelong supporter of the policy embodied in the New Towns Bill." He said he recognized the wisdom of putting factories on one side of the road and residents on the other, but it was "carrying principle to this point of madness" to insist that people already living on one side should move to the other.

**Site Unsuitable**

Ewart Gladstone Culpin, planning expert and native of Stevenage, said the site was "unsuitable" and the taking of a 10-mile radius of Stevenage would lead to a population of between 250,000 and 350,000.

"That would be a tragedy," he said.

For the Metropolitan Water Board, H. R. McDowell said the site had to be pumped from the River Thames and the expense would fall largely upon London water consumers.

Hony Francis Conlin, chief engineer of the board, said no consideration had been given to the water supply of London. "The Stevenage site is about the worst that could have been selected from that point of view."

For the National Farmers' Union, Arthur Capewell, K.C., said the site would be "too near the magnetic field of London and a large number of people who would live in it would work in London."

Inspector Morris closed the meeting by promising that the development plan, before it was considered by the Minister of Town and Country Planning, would be submitted to the people of Stevenage.

**ROYAL ACADEMY POPULAR**

Nearly 200,000 people paid to see the annual summer show of the Royal Academy in London this year. Not were the sales to be despaired, totalling in all 691 works aggregating 22,391 pounds, comments a London correspondent. What the purchasing public went for chiefly were smaller pieces, preferably flower studies or soothing landscapes, and there was quite a demand for black-and-white studies. The picture of the year was Dame Laura Knight's "Nuremberg," probably because of its intense topical interest as well as its dramatic treatment. The painting was commissioned by the museum staff and of the women's committee of the Diamond Jubilee Campaign. It is their skill at a close variation of it. A draught board and men of the XVIII dynasty, about 1450 B. C., reconstructed by the Egyptian department, served as one model for the modern version of the game developed by George S. Parker and Roy Howard in collaboration with Ambrose Lansing, curator of Egyptology at the Metropolitan.
