TORONTO, Aug. 5.—(CP)—Jersey City Giants strengthened their hold on fourth place in the International League today by scoring a double victory over the last place Maple Leafs 12-0 and 3-1. The Little Giants pounded three Toronto hurlers for 18 safe drives in the first game to score easily behind the effective flinging of big Hy Vandenberg. Vandenberg drove in the first two runs and had three safe hits to pace the winning attack along with Dickshot and Jensen. Johnny Pezzullo, who gave up 10 hits in the first five frames was charged with the defeat. Sid Cohen bested Carl Fischer in a southerly duel in the late game. Fischer's only three passes were bunched with singles by Vernon and Sturgeon and a double by Dickshot in the second and third innings for the three Jersey City runs. A double by Tyler and Dejonghe's single cost Cohen a shut-out in the fourth.

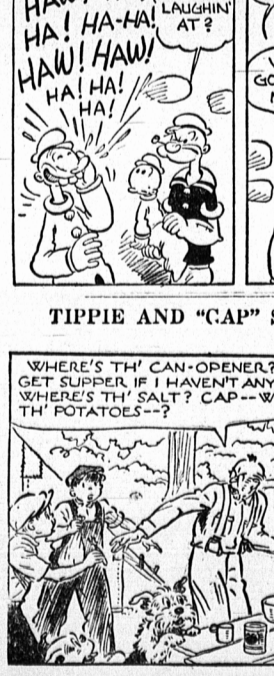
Leaves Today For Road Race

LONDON, Aug. 5.—(CP)—Two brothers of Tommy Farr, the heavyweight boxer, have been decorated with the medal of the order of the British Empire and commended by Lord Beaverbrook, Minister of Aircraft Production, for their bravery in an explosion in a south England foundry. When the blast rocked the plant, John, 28, carried an injured workmate to safety while wreckage fell all about him. Then he and 21-year-old Douglas went back into the pitch-dark foundry, cleared 1,000 pounds of molten metal from the furnaces and helped save the works from being set on fire.

Pirates Home With Spoil After Road Trip

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Puffing pitching brought Pittsburgh Pirates home today from their most successful road trip in several years with a record of 10 games won and four lost. Currently, the Pirates form is about the best in the majors and is attributed mainly to the steady hurling, in sharp contrast to the sorrowful spectacle presented earlier in the season when the Bucs were staggering under pitching that was plain punk. Rip Sewell seems to be shaping up as the ace of the fast-developing Pirate hurling staff. He pitched three victories on the eastern trip, including his four-hitter against the Phils yesterday, to bring his triumphs for the season to nine against two losses. Mace (Fireman) Brown, who several times has been graduated from the bullpen to a starting assignment, likely will matriculate again into a starter as the Pirates open a drive tomorrow to push into the first division. He pitched a three-hitter Saturday. Other hurlers contributing to the improved game of the Pirates are Johnny Lanning and Danny MacFadden, both of whom have shown flashes of brilliance, and Ken Heintzman and Dick Lathrop, a pair of steadily improving lefthanders.

Pound, Dollar Both Advance

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—(CP)—The "free" pound Sterling and the Canadian dollar advanced in value in relation to the United States dollar in the Foreign Exchange Market today. Free Sterling rose two cents to \$2.90 and the Dominion currency 1-8 cent to a discount of 12 7-8 per cent. (Ottawa Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 9.09-9.91 per cent discount). The Swiss franc finished .01 cent higher at 22.75 cents. The strain in British-Japanese relations stirred interest in Far Eastern currencies. The Shanghai and Hong Kong dollars showed sizeable losses.

U. S. Senate Group Approves Compulsory Military Training

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Legislation for compulsory military training of American youth finally received the approval today of the Senate Military Committee, which chairman Senator Morris Sheppard of Texas, declared on the Senate floor that he firmly believes Hitler intends to attack the United States. Ready, after many delays and postponements, for consideration in the Senate proper, the measure awaited only the passage of a bill authorizing President Roosevelt to call out the National Guard and army reserve officers for intensive training. Sheppard's statement that Hitler plans eventually to attack the United States was made in the course of a brisk exchange with Sen. Burton Wheeler, Montana Democrat.

FRENCH FACTORIES RESUME

PARIS, Aug. 2.—(Delayed)—(AP via Berlin)—Citroen automobile factory officials reported today they are employing 25 per cent of the normal personnel on a half-day basis and hope to resume full production soon. The Renault factory, which normally employs 35,000 persons, reported it expects to hire more than 10,000 soon on a part-time basis.

Johnny Whitehead Pitches No-run, No-hit Game To Drop Tigers From Lead

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Johnny Whitehead veteran St. Louis right-hander, pitched a no-hit, no-run game against Detroit Tigers today in the nightcap of a doubleheader called at the end of 5 1-2 innings on account of rain. The Browns won 4-0 after losing the opener 9-2 and dropped the Tigers out of first place in the American League. Mel Harder of Cleveland Indians pitched a five-hit, 10-1 victory over Chicago White Sox. Playing at home the pennant-hungry Indians rushed into a three-run lead in the second inning off Chunky Ed Smith, a southpaw. Four singles by Rollie Hemsley, Ben Chapman, Weatherly and Lou Bourdreau and a fumble by Smith produced the tallies. They added two more in the fourth. Lefty Fritz Ostermuller, who couldn't get going in the first half of the season, pitched Boston Red Sox to a 4-1 home victory over New York Yankees. Ostermuller kept seven hits scattered and had a shutout until the eighth when he walked two men and Joe Dimaggio singled one of them home. Ernie Bonham, a righthander recalled last week from Kansas City went the whole distance for the Yankees and did a plucky job of spacing 10 hits. But one of them was Jimmie Fox's 25th home run behind a walk to Manager Joe Cronin in the fifth.

Professional Football League Becomes Reality

BUFFALO, N. Y., Aug. 5.—(AP)—The American professional football league became a reality today after a two-day organization meeting at which William D. Griffith of Columbus, O., former publicity director for Ohio State University, was named league president. Griffith said the league will be composed of six teams: Buffalo, N. Y., Indians; New York Yankees; Boston Bears; Cincinnati, Bengals; Columbus, Bullies; Milwaukee, Chiefs.

MAKES MONEY FROM CHICKENS

LONDON, Aug. 5.—(CP)—A butcher at a south-east coast town collected £15 (\$67) from the Red Cross Society when two of his chickens were killed by machine gun bullets from an enemy plane during an air battle along the coast. He auctioned off one for £10 and raffled the other two for £5.
