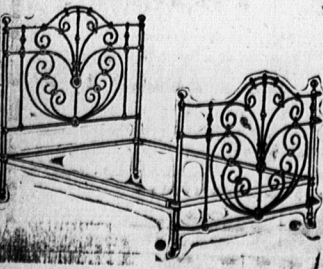

FREE DELIVERY ENDORSED.

With last evening the coupon vote conducted by The Guardian to test the opinion of our citizens for and against the introduction of the carrier system of mail delivery, closed. The result is almost unprecedented in elections, for the vote cast is found to be unanimous in favor of the proposed improvement. Not a solitary coupon was found to be marked against it.

The election was remarkable in several ways. It was entirely free from bribery or corrupt practices. No money, or intoxicants were used, no inducements were held out, no promise of contract, office or reward was made, no threat or intimidation was exercised in order to secure votes for or against the proposed measure. It was a free and independent, unpurchased and unpurchasable vote that was recorded.

There was no impersonation, no telegraphing, no ballot-box stuffing. And there were no spoiled coupons. Every voter recorded his or her name and street address and the coupons were properly marked. These facts attest in the strongest way the intelligence and standing of those who voted, and sufficiently account for the fact that the number who voted was not so large as might have been hoped for.

We thank the scores of citizens who took the trouble to send in their coupons after having marked them for free delivery. We believe they represent the views of hundreds more who did not avail themselves of the privilege of voting. The fact is that the entire absence of opposition prevented the awakening of such interest as is always felt in a keen contest. Charlottetown wants the carrier system and on this the first test of public opinion on the question our citizens have pronounced in its favor without a dissenting voice.

In forty-one cities and towns of Canada the price of gas for illuminating purposes ranges from 80 cents per thousand feet in Toronto to \$3.25 in Fredericton. Thirty-four towns are at or under the two dollar mark, and twelve are \$1.50 or under. Gas for fuel or power purposes in Canadian towns costs from 80 cents to \$1.87 per thousand feet, the lowest being 80 cents in Toronto, 95 cents in Sarnia and the highest \$1.07 in Listowel, Ont. St. John pays \$1.75 for illuminating gas and \$1.25 for heating while Halifax pays \$2 and \$1 for gas for these purposes respectively.

The Canadian canals are open only seven months of the year. They cost for construction considerably more than the Government Railways. They produce no revenue at all save the rent of some water powers supplied to manufacturers along their route. This amounted last year to \$70,000. During the same year over three million dollars was expended upon them. Over and above their receipts the canals cost the country more than \$400,000 a month for the time they were in operation. And yet the people of Ontario and Quebec who are served by these canals are calling out that deficits must cease on the Government Railway.

HIGH PAY FOR CORNETIST.

PARIS, Jan. 17.—Mr. Aronson, the American chamberlain, has engaged Cornetist Chambers for a tour of the United States and Canada, commencing in October. Chambers will receive \$1,500 weekly, which is a record fee for a cornetist.

which he has caused to be directed upon every line of work in the congregation.

The year 1905 has been indeed a prosperous one in our church. At the beginning of the year a substantial increase in revenue was asked for. The congregation responded loyally, with the result that our regular collections (envelopes and loose) amount to \$2,835.62, being an increase of \$500.00 over 1904, and are, we believe, the largest in the history of the congregation. These receipts, during the past ten years, have been as follows:—

THE TRICKS OF CHINAMEN

MONTREAL, Jan. 17.—Frederick Herst, who was arrested two weeks ago, on a charge of theft, laid by two Chinamen, has been released and his release brings to light the plot of the Chinamen to facilitate the escape of a fellow-countryman who has evaded payment of a \$500 head tax.

Herst, who is a Swede, came over to St. John on the ship with the Chinaman, and on his escape was engaged by the customs and steamship company, which was responsible for the tax, to run down the fugitive. Herst had mailed a letter to an address in Montreal for the missing Celestial and went to that house to investigate. While the officers were busy getting papers for the search, Herst was left on guard and the Chinaman had him arrested, first on a charge of rifling a trunk, but when that petered out, of stealing. The plot was so successful as to give them two weeks' start and the imprisonment has resulted in the serious illness of Herst, who was injured in the South African war, and yet carries a piece of shell in his body, which is now endangering his life.
