Canadians In London

The Canadian High Commissioner's Office in London Week by Week
18th September, 1924

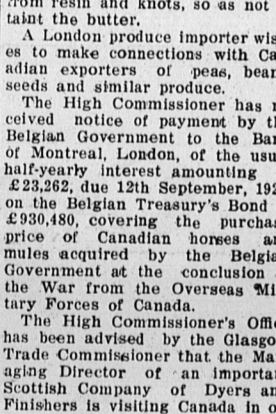
During the week ended 17th September, 209 visitors called at the Office, out of whom 139 obtained interviews and 33 registered. On the 15th September the High Commissioner's Office circulated to the addresses on the Canadian Official Mining News Letter a "Mining Note" dealing with the Mineral Production of Canada during the first six months of 1924. Another note based on the report of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics dealing with the Gold Production of Canada last year was also sent out. A number of "Mining Notes" are in preparation for circulation next week including one in regard to the return to Canada of Dr. Alfred G. Wilson and Mr. Wyatt Malcolm of the Department of Mines, another one calling attention to the publication of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics of its Annual Report on the Mineral Production of Canada, 1922, and a Mining Note on the Summary Report of Part A of the Geological Survey, Department of Mines. Other Notes which are being circulated deal with Volume 11 of the Report of the Canadian Arctic Expedition 1913-18, dealing with Geology and Geography, and the First General Report of the Lignite Utilization Board of Canada, containing some valuable papers dealing with the experiments which have been made in connection with the problem of carbonizing and briquetting of Saskatchewan Lignites.

Canadian Cattle Shippers will be interested in the announcement made by the British Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries that the provisions of paragraph (2) of Article 45 of the Importation of Canadian Cattle Order 1923 are not to be put into operation until the 1st November, 1924, pending further consideration of the question as to the carrying of animals on the forward well-deck during the months of October to March inclusive. In the meantime discussions will take place between Canadian Shipping Interests and the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries.

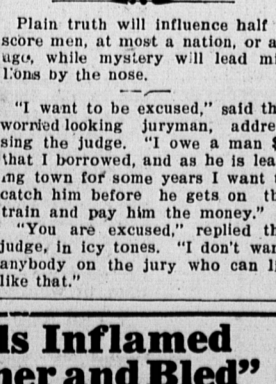

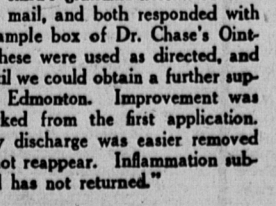
