A meeting of the principal swine breeders of P.E. Island met in A. Home & Co's store yesterday afternoon and was called to order by appointing Peter Brodie, chairman who opened the meeting with a few well chosen remarks in which he set forth the claims of the swine industry to this Province. He stated that according to statistics for last year the swine industry amounted to some \$700,000 while that of the dairy industry was some \$400,000 and that if the bacon hog were not behind the dairy cow that the dairy industry would not be flourishing as it is at present. Mr. Brodie was followed by several other speakers, after which it was agreed that the people present form themselves into an organization to be called The Stock Breeders Association of P.E. Island. On motion it was agreed that a meeting would be held in Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, on Tuesday next at 11 a. m., notice of which to be advertised through the papers and that the appointing of officers and pressing of claims to the Provincial Government for a larger grant to the Exhibition Association be left to that meeting. The business of revising the prize list for swine department was then discussed, after which the following breeders were then appointed to draft resolutions for the next meeting in connection with the governing and exhibiting of the different classes of stock. Swine, Wm. J. Gibson, Marshfield; pure-bred and grade cattle, Roper Bros., Royalty; and C. T. Ferguson, Marshfield; sheep, Albert Boswell, French Fort; Lane Boswell, Lot 48, and Wm. Clark, North Wiltshire. Horses, P. S. Brown, Charlottetown; Daniel Reid, Victoria Cross; McKinley Bros., North River, and W. A. Miller Marshfield. This brought a very enthusiastic meeting to a close.
