THE INDIANS CLAIM PARK IN SARNIA.

SARNIA, Ont., July 13—Notice has been served on the town of Sarnia that the Indians of Sarnia reserve lay claim to the tract of land known as Dufferin Park, in the south part of the town, and formally demand that it be relinquished by the corporation.

The land is situated just south of the Imperial oil works, and was part of the Indian reserve many years ago. When the upper end of the reserve was absorbed into the town of Sarnia the Indian department donated the park free of charge to the town, so long as it was used for park

purposes. The construction of the oil refinery immediately to the north prevented its successful use for a pleasure ground, and it is believed that the town will have difficulty in showing that it is used for park purposes.

RECIPROCITY BILL ATTACKED BY INSURGENTS

WASHINGTON, July 13—Two important insurgent speeches against the Canadian Reciprocity Bill were made today, when Senators Lafolette of Wisconsin, and Bristow of Kansas, introduced their amendments to that measure and spoke in favor of them, and against the specific features of the pending Bill.

Senator Lafolette excoriated President Taft's Administration, not only with reference to the tariff legislation proposed but also on his conservation politics.

ATTACKED SUGAR TARIFF.

Senator Bristow renewed his fight against the present sugar tariff, and urged the repeal of the "16 Mites standard" on imported sugar, which he declared operates entirely in the interests of the American Sugar Refining Company.

Hoping to reach a vote on the Reciprocity Bill next week, his Chairman Penrose of the Senate Finance Committee regards as "next to a certainty," managers on both sides of the Senate chamber are figuring seriously on the subsequent program. Most of them have counted upon getting away after perfunctory votes on the Democratic free list and woolen Bills, but today it became evident that other legislation will be pressed for consideration. The friends of the Arizona, New Mexico statehood and apportionment Bills especially, will demand votes, as will advocates of the Campaign Publicity Bill.

OTHER IMPORTANT BILLS.

There is an agreement to the Statehood Bill eliminating the judiciary recall question, which would render the measure generally satisfactory, but the understanding does not extend to the insurgent Republicans and there is a possibility of a
