CRITICISM IS UNJUST SAYS DR. LAMB

TORONTO, Aug. 6.—Expressing his amazement at the various criticisms voiced by members of Canada's Olympic team since their return to Canada, Dr. A. S. Lamb, chairman of the Quebec branch of the A. A. U. of C. and who was in Paris at the time of the Olympiad, stated yesterday that he fully appreciated P. J. Mulqueen, chairman of the Canadian Olympic committee, calling for a thorough investigation of the charges. Such an investigation, said Dr. Lamb, would prove the utter falsehoods of the various allegations. Dr. Lamb declared he was with the boys during their sojourn in Paris and that not the least pleasing factor he observed was the harmony which prevailed among the entire party. "I was particularly impressed with the spirit of co-operation," he said, "and I heard no criticism during the entire nine days of the Olympiad."

He described Granville's criticisms as "perfectly ridiculous." Granville, it will be recalled, reiterated criticisms of other athletes and said that favoritism had been shown. Granville placed special stress on the fact that Coach Cornelius and some of the boys had stayed at an hotel of par excellence, while he and others had to content with a hostel less comfortable. Dr. Lamb stated yesterday that the truth of the matter was that the hotel wherein Granville abided cost some 25 francs more than the hotel where the others stayed.

Dr. Lamb, armed with receipts of payments made to hotels and athletes while over on the other side of the herring pond, appeared more amused with what he described as "those surprising revelations" than annoyed. They had, he said, wholly contradicted his own
