A TUNNEL FOR IRELAND.

The rather novel idea contained in the prescribing of a tunnel connecting Ireland and England as a cure for the troubles of the former country and its people is causing some talk.

The project is seriously advised in a book by G. Locker-Lampson, a distinguished English publicist. "A Consideration of the Fate of Ireland in the Nineteenth Century." The volume will be published in this country next week by E. P. Dutton & Co. Mr. Locker-Lampson makes an exhaustive examination of Irish conditions—and finds what others have found. The chief interest of his book is in the remedy he proposes. He does not believe Ireland's ills will be cured by Home Rule. He proposes closer union, rather than separation. Only he suggests that that union be commercial and social, not political. He proposes the formation of a company or companies to tunnel the Irish Channel. The plan is physically feasible. Mr. Locker-Lampson believes it would be financially profitable to the builders, and that it would be of inestimable mutual advantage to two lands which now stand envisaged in misunderstanding, suspicion and hate.

The book is a carefully prepared history, going back, in an introductory chapter, to the "sowing of the seed" of trouble in the various attempts of England to govern Ireland during the four centuries prior to the Act of Union in 1801.

This tunnel theory is given as the author's main contribution to a solution of the Irish question. In it he sees an excellent commercial scheme from which the builders of the tunnel would derive an abundant profit, while the comingling of the two peoples would stimulate various trades and industries at the same time that the desired "mutual understanding" between the races would be brought about.

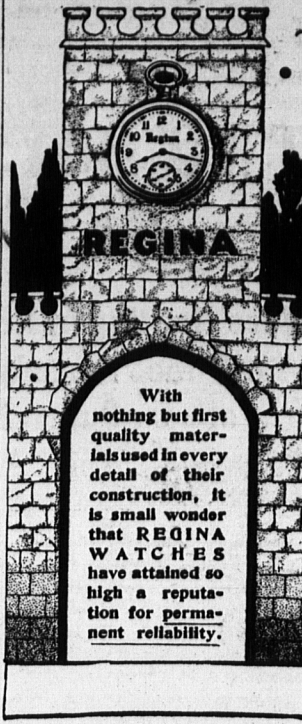

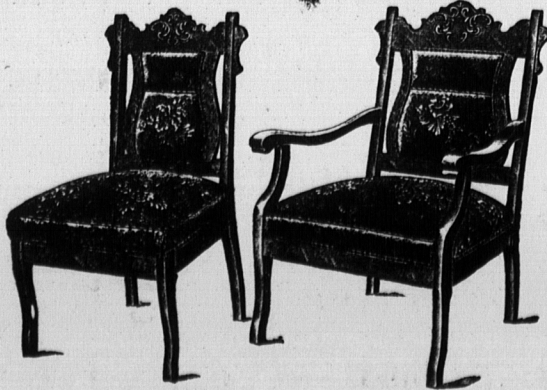
