CIVIC GOVERNMENT BY COMMISSION.

With further reference to a recent article in The Guardian, dealing with the Commission form of Civic Government, we have made enquiries concerning the working of the system in the city of St. John, N. B., and have obtained the following particulars:

The Commission form of government has been in force in St. John for some eight months and the invariable opinion is that it is proving very much more satisfactory than the old form of Civic Council or Aldermanic government.

There are five Commissioners in all, the Mayor, who is Commissioner of Finance and Public Affairs; a Commissioner of Public Safety, which includes Police, Fire, Lighting, the Market, City Hall, etc.; a Commissioner of Public Works, which includes all sidewalks, streets, both construction and repairs, public parks, playgrounds, etc.; a Commissioner of Water and Sewerage and a Commissioner in control of the Harbor, Ferries and Public Lands.

These Commissioners were elected under the double election idea, the first election being held two weeks before the last. There were, at the first election, twenty-one candidates and these were cut down to the two leaders for mayor and the eight leaders for Commissioners on the first ballot. The second election made choice of one of the two candidates for mayor and four of the eight candidates for Commissioners. The mayor is elected for two years and the Commissioners will, in future elections, be elected for four years, but in order that there should be a change every two years, on the first election the two men heading the Poll were elected for four years and the two lowest for two years.

Each of the Commissioners receives a salary of \$3000 and, with the exception of the Mayor, is required to

CHICAGO, Jan. 12—A summons to appear before the Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections, has been served on Willie W. Detectives and deputy United States marshals and secret service operatives had been seeking Winkfield, and he was found by a deputy who overheard a telephone conversation giving the negro's whereabouts.

GOVERNMENT PETITION PERMANENT INJUNCTION.

NEW YORK, Jan. 12—The government's petition for a permanent injunction against the Eastern states lumber dealers' association, alleged to be a combination in restraint of trade was granted today by Judge Lacombe, Cox, Ward and Noyes, sitting in the federal district court. Final arguments for and against the injunction were heard a few weeks ago.

The defendants include, beside the association named, the New York Lumber trade association, the Building material men's association, the New Jersey lumbermen's association, the Lumber dealers association of Connecticut, the Massachusetts retail lumber dealers' association, to which one of the leading Worcester dealers tells The Post practically all the dealers in this city belong—the Lumber dealers' association of Rhode Island, the Retail lumbermen's association of Baltimore, the Lumber exchange of the District of Columbia, and their officers, directors, members and delegates.



SONOMA RETURNS WITHOUT PARTNER.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12—The naval tug Sonoma, the convoy of the repair ship Panther, which left Brooklyn Navy Yard two hours ahead of the repair ship, has arrived at Guantanamo, Cuba, according to Navy Department advices today. The tug, under the command of Chief Boatswain William Derrington of Massachusetts, reported that she passed through a gale on Friday last and got out of touch with the Panther, of which she has heard nothing since.

Although the little boat was almost swamped by the huge waves, she escaped with little damage. All her lifeboats and superstructure, however, were carried away, and she proceeded to Guantanamo under half power. The Sonoma was not equipped with wireless, and, therefore, was unable to report to any naval station along the coast.



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

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
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
