TEMPORARY SUSPENSION OF STEAMER AT SUMMERSIDE.

The following circular has been sent to all agents and conductors. Commencing Wednesday, August 22nd, 1917, services between Pt. du Chene and Summerside will be temporarily suspended in order to have S. S. "Northumberland" go on Dry Dock.

Daily service except Sunday will be inaugurated between Charlottetown and Pictou with S. S. "Aramore." Commencing Wednesday, August 22nd Steamer will leave Charlottetown at 7.00 a. m., arrive Pictou about 11.00 a. m., enabling passengers for New England points to make connection at Oxford Junction with No. 9 train and with Maritime Express at same point for Amherst, Moncton, Montreal and points west, returning. Steamer will leave Pictou at 6.00 p. m., arriving Charlottetown about 10.00 p. m. Agents will continue to issue via Pt. du Chene at fares applying via that route and advise passengers that tickets will be honored via Charlottetown and Pictou without additional charge. Conductors will honor tickets accordingly.

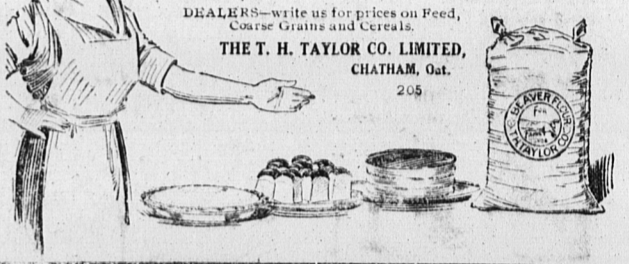

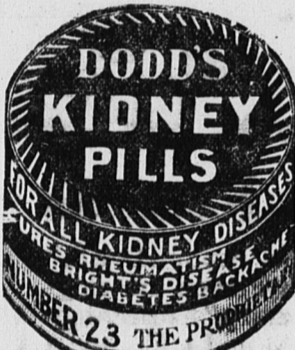

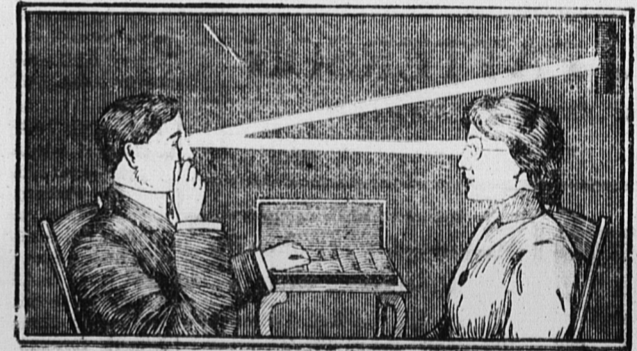
