Has the forest area of Prince Edward Island ever been computed or are there any figures giving an idea of the value of the available wood in this Province? Canada's forest area has been variously estimated at from eight hundred million to three hundred million acres. The latter is the latest estimate. It was given by Dr. B. E. Fernow, the recently appointed Dean of the Faculty of Forestry at the University of Toronto. He is one of the best authorities on forest subjects on the continent, and for years a head of the United States Bureau of Forestry. His estimate, he thinks, "will cover" the commercially valuable timberland area, actual and potential. At this time the forest area of Canada is "not much more than one-half of the commercial forest area of the United States." R. H. Campbell, Superintendent of the Forestry for the Dominion Government, gives a rather larger estimate. He has calculated the forest area of the Dominion at about 35 million acres, divided as follows:—

"Inexhaustible" used to be a favorite word to describe Canada's forests. But the drop from the old figure of 800 million acres to the more recent ones given above shows clearly that the more Canada's forest wealth is investigated, the less are people inclined to use that word. Great as this wealth may be, it is for Canada to husband her resources, and make her forests a permanent asset. In order to do this, she must carefully protect her forests and see to their being reproduced, that a future supply of timber may be ensured from them. This would mean the careful management of these lands on scientific and business principles, and these it is that the forestry movement is seeking to introduce throughout the Dominion.

Some very handsome and attractive wall calendars have in the past been issued by the Intercolonial Railway, but it is safe to say that all previous ones are eclipsed by the one just to hand for 1908, which is not only exceedingly artistic, but one which should be held in great value by those who desire a calendar for a classmate's sake as well as for its artistic excellence. It is a twelve sheet calendar a separate sheet for each month, the months commencing in February of this year and ending in January 1909. The design shows a good deal of originality, and for the workmanship the lithographer is much to be commended. The moon's head is there of course. It would not be an I.C.R. calendar or I.C.R. anything else without the moon's head. So the altered monarch appears in the upper left hand corner encircled by a shield of blue on which appear the words "The Fast Line." "The People's Railway" in letters of white. The moon's head is in a background of brightens the effect. Surrounding the upper forehead and antlers rather lower half of the circle and spreading across the face of the calendar is a wreath of maple leaves in green and autumnal tints. The leaves form the frame of a half long view, a different one appearing on each month's sheet, being well selected photos representing some of the best scenes along the line. In large white letters on a background of scarlet, is the word "Intercolonial" and in black letters just over the date tab are the words "Prince Edward Island Railway of Canada." Running vertically on each side of the date tab in red and black lettering are fitting references to Canada's famous trains, the Maritime Express and the Ocean Limited. The calendars are sent out for mailing in cardboard cartons with printed labels which announce that they are sent with the compliments of the Intercolonial Railway and Canada, by and in connection with the word "Canada" appears conspicuously. Thousands of them are sent annually to many parts of the world and so wide a reputation have the calendars earned that the applications for them yearly grow larger.
