Chas. Allan, Amherst, crossed from Pictou yesterday en route for his home in Searlestown to spend his holidays.

In the Police Court yesterday Joseph Shepherd was charged with jail breaking and the case was adjourned till today.

D. Scott Walker, Kensington, who has resided in the North West for some years past arrived in this City yesterday and was a passenger west en route to his home.

Mrs. Capt. Jas. W. Ryan and her son, S. B. French crossed from Pictou yesterday to this city and left on the afternoon train for Victoria where they intend to reside.

C. A. McNutt, Kensington, brought to the City yesterday a very fine carload of lambs, which he bought in the vicinity of Kensington. The lambs will cross by the Northumberland today.

W. C. Turner's store window on Sunnyside is bright with Christmas suggestions. What could be more acceptable than the dainty handkerchiefs and aprons there displayed, while the store proper is simply teeming with pretty ribbons, collars, ties, in fact everything suitable for gift giving.

A. N. McKay's large show window on Sunnyside is from time to time solving the puzzle of what to give for Christmas. The array of china and glassware is simply endless in style and pattern and anything desired from the simple cup and saucer to the rich piece of cut glass is there, in fine assortment, ready for the shopper.

The Turret Bell has been successfully jacked off the rocks, and is now in 74 feet of water, at low tide. She has been pumped full of water, so that she cannot move during the winter. It is now too late in the season to remove her, but this will be done in the spring. One of Capt. Reid's men will live on board the steamer during the winter. The steamer was moved about 700 feet to her new position, now pointing north-east instead of south-west, as when she went on.—Pat.

There was a very fair attendance at the city market yesterday. Butter was sold at twenty-five to twenty-six cents, eggs at twenty-eight cents, ducks per pair seventy-five to one dollar, chickens at fifty to seventy-five, geese at ninety to one ten each. Pork was selling at seven to seven and three quarters, straw (loose) at thirty to forty-five and hay (loose) at forty to fifty per cent, pressed straw at six dollars and pressed hay at eight-fifty to nine dollars per ton. Black oats at forty and white at thirty-eight and thirty-nine cents, potatoes at twenty to twenty-one and turnips at thirteen and fourteen cents per bus.

Alexander McLeod, a former P. E. Island man, who is now a prosperous rancher and farmer in Saskatchewan, has been spending the past two or three weeks in Moncton with his brother-in-law, Ald. McLeod, and left last week for New York to spend the winter in American cities, returning to Moncton in the spring. Mr. McLeod was formerly a resident of Biddeford, P. E. I. Eighteen years ago he removed his family to Western Canada, locating near Saskatoon, and today he is one of the large wheat growers and ranchers in that district. He owns a farm of eight hundred acres, and the present year it yielded besides other crops, eight thousand bushels of wheat. Besides being quite an extensive wheat grower, Mr. McLeod raises considerable beef and farms generally on an extensive scale. The farm today is being worked by Mr. McLeod's sons, he himself being in a position to take life comparatively easy. Mr. McLeod has one son a clergyman and another a doctor in the West. Mrs. McLeod, who accompanied her husband to the West, is spending the winter with her father on the Island.—Moncton Exc.
