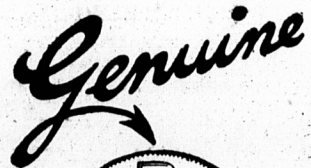

MR. RONALD MCKENZIE

He died at Dundas on Wednesday, the 6th inst, very suddenly. Mr. Ronald J. McKenzie, aged 73, the prayer expressed by Tennyson was his "Sunset and Evening-star".

He is survived by his second wife (his first wife having predeceased him thirteen years ago) and one son, David H. who farms the old homestead.

The late Mr. McKenzie was an intelligent and successful farmer and took a deep interest in the political and community life of this Province. He was well versed in Scottish history and was a member of the Caledonian Club. Funeral on Friday (8th) was largely attended and testified to the respect in which he was held by all his neighbors and friends. His Brethren of the Masonic order attended from St. John's and after services in the church his body was laid to rest with full Masonic Honour in the family burying place Dundas Presbyterian Cemetery.

Lloyd George Coming Smuts Is Invited

LONDON, July 15.—It is officially confirmed that Premier Lloyd George has decided to go to Washington to attend the conference on disarmament, to which President Harding has invited the leading powers of the world.

At the headquarters of the South African delegation to the Dominion conference it was learned that Premier Jan Smuts has been invited by the United States administration to participate in the conference. He is unable to give his final answer until he ascertains whether his presence is shortly to be required in South Africa.

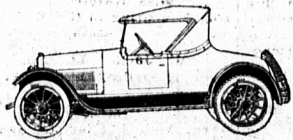

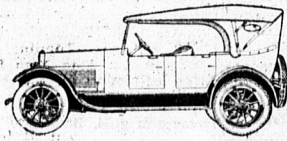
